There was a very large attendance of mourning friends. All the members of Rev. Dr. Bennet's family had arrived, except E. J. Bennet, who is in the Yukon. The floral tributes included a great mass of beautiful cut flowers and there was one magnificent wreath of roses, sweet peas, carnations and other flowers from the statistical branch of the Customs at Ottawa. Interment took place at Fernhill, the services at the grave being conducted by Rev. Mr. Fraser. J. E. B. McCready, of the Charlottetown GUARDIAN, a son-in-law of the deceased clergyman, was present at the funeral.—St. John Star.
