LACK OF RECRUITS FOR SOCIAL SERVICE

MONTREAL, May 17.—Lack of trained experienced social workers is partly due to the fact that there are few students inclined to this avocation who are able to pay their way through the two-year course at the university, in the opinion of Dr. C. A. Dawson, head of the School for Social Workers at McGill University. Commenting on the report made by Miss Charlotte Whitton, executive director of the Canadian Council on Child and Family Welfare in Ottawa recently this McGill professor felt that her remarks about university training schools were about correct. Miss Whitton was reported, in part as saying: "Admission and training requirements have not yet been standardized in any degree commensurate with those of the other professions, the number of graduates has been small and the emergence from this group of competent executives small, even when a community or government is convinced of the need and value of trained experienced social workers it has become an almost impossible task to obtain them."

At McGill the major difficulty has been in getting the right kind of students in large enough numbers to take up this work. Dr. Dawson felt that the facilities at the school were sufficient to train many more than are now enrolled, and when a larger number of students took the courses, that competent social workers would be turned out. It could in no way be said that the avocation was overcrowded at the present time. The McGill school has tried, as much as possible to keep pace with new methods and ideas in their training courses, and at the present time certain important additions to the curriculum are under consideration to bring the work up to date.

CANADA'S APPLE SALES LARGER THAN AFRICA'S

OTTAWA, May 18.—Official trade returns of the United Kingdom show that Canada sells more apples in the Motherland than all other Empire countries combined, and is exceeded only by the United States. South Africa's sales of apples are so small they are not even mentioned separately in the trade returns. Total imports of apples by the United Kingdom in 1929 were 6,089,088 hundredweight, of which Canada supplied 1,707,238 hundredweight; Australia, 351,908 hundredweight; New Zealand, 258,075 hundredweight, while South Africa was included in "other British countries," which supplied only 8,378 hundredweight. The United States sold 3,000,163 hundredweight to Britain. American apple growers have a much bigger crop than Canada, and a much greater home market. The surplus is sold in England for what it will realize.

TEAS REPLACING DINNERS IN BRITISH COMMONWEALTH SOCIAL HABITS CHANGE

LONDON, MAY.—The House of Commons has taken tea. The advent of the Labor party has done more than change the occupancy of the treasury benches. It has brought big changes in the social habits of members. There were 110,000 teas served in the parliamentary restaurant last year. Tea rather than dinner, has become the popular meal of the day. "There are not so many dinner parties now as when the Conservatives were in power," observes Joe Compton, Chairman of the kitchen committee.

HANDLING BLOAT IN DAIRY COWS
 (Experimental Farms Note)

Bloating of dairy cows on pasture is, and apparently always will be, a serious problem in herd management wherever legumes are used as pastures. This is perhaps more particularly true when the legume is alfalfa.

At the Dominion Experimental Station, Sackville, British Columbia, alfalfa is used as a base in all pastures, and in spite of the best of care being taken, considerable trouble arises from bloat. It is possibly more severe at that particular period when the first crop of alfalfa would be approaching the blossoming period.

The most practical means of lessening the danger is in the exercise of care in seeing that conditions under which bloating might occur are avoided. In general, cows should never be turned on alfalfa pasture with empty stomachs. A small feed of dry hay before turning out is good practice. Water should be readily available in or near the pasture at all times. Avoid turning on freshly irrigated pastures, and on pastures that are wet from natural precipitation or heavy dews, or coated with frost.

Good results in avoiding serious trouble have also been found to follow the use of grasses mixed with the alfalfa when seeding down a pasture. Cows prefer grass to alfalfa or sweet clover, and will take the edge off their appetites with grass before feeding on the alfalfa. Therefore if possible, use grasses mixed with the alfalfa in seeding down permanent or semi-permanent pastures.

As a specific in case of severe bloat when the emergency does not quite call for the use of a trocar, neutral oil used as a drench has given highly satisfactory results. Many of the standard remedies which were used were effective, but imparted an odour to the milk, or had other objectional features. Neutral oil, given alone as a drench in quantities as small as one pint, has proven almost immediately effective. This oil imparts no odour to the milk; it is easy to give, and does not impair the natural appetite of the animal, nor interfere with the secretion of milk. Care must be taken with this as with any other drench when administering it not to choke the animal or get any of the drench down on the lungs or fatal pneumonia is very likely to follow.
