site of the discovery of the so-called "Venus the Second of Willendorf," the dainty figure some ten inches long discovered last year.

Venus the First, discovered at Willendorf in 1908, possess traditional Viennese plumpness, but the second, says Dr. Bayer, displays exactly the slender lines of modern woman.

She is of ivory, having been carved from a mammoth's tusk, with which lay the bones of an ice-fox, doubtless to propitiate the gods of the chase. It is known that Neanderthal men always buried the bones and hides of animals of the kinds they desired to kill as an offering to the gods.

Dr. Bayer, who is continuing his excavations here, has also discovered a heartstone with reindeer bones which remained from the canals of primitive man, and nearby, a collection of cosmetics with which the low-browed beauty of 25,000 years ago adorned herself.

They include sticks of graphite, which were possibly eye-brow pencils, lumps of ochre, and receptacles containing rouge powder.

The graphite shows smooth worn places where it was applied to the face, with reindeer fat to make it adhere to the skin.
