

SENATOR PLATT AND HIS PRETTY WIFE

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—When Senator Platt at three score and ten married the vivacious matron, Mrs. Lillian Janeway, his son and friends were astounded, and of course the cynical made prophecies. The world this morning publishes a page story, the gist of which is that the aged and infirm senator and his lively and lovely spouse have come to the parting of the ways. A good looking coachman in the employ of the Platts is a central figure of the story. Senator Platt, Mrs. Platt and everybody concerned say the whole thing is a lie. The beautiful Mr. Platt is a down east product, and her first husband was a New Brunswicker named Snow. Mrs. Platt

was Carrie Thompson. She was born at Portage Lake (Me.) As the World tells it:—
