Discuss Rest Room For Market Bldg.

Representatives of the Travel Bureau met with the Mayor and members of the City Council yesterday to discuss the rest room which the Council proposes to provide in the Market Building in Charlottetown.

It is the considered opinion of the Travel Bureau executive, supported by a large number of business and professional citizens, who have given the matter much thought, that such alteration as may be made at the Market Building should have for its prime objective the improving of conditions with respect to the tourist traffic.

Mr. J. M. Murley, spokesman for the group that waited on the Mayor and Council said, "A plan has been prepared" he continued, "which would appear to bring about such an improvement. It calls for an opening at the west end with rest room facilities for ladies, and adequate wash room accommodation for men, with certain space allotted to the Travel Bureau where information and literature may be obtained."

The City of Charlottetown has, for a number of years, contributed sums varying from \$250 to \$350 to assist the Travel Bureau in the work of publicity. In view of the determination to keep expenditure within due bounds and even reduce where possible, this suggestion should meet with favor from the standpoint of economy, as the City will be able to substitute this free space in lieu of a money grant, the speaker said.

Three million dollars is Prince Edward Island's proportion of a percentage basis of the three hundred million dollars predicted by Director D. Leo Dolan of the Campaign in Canada this year. Mr. Murley pointed out in his paper submitted at the meeting, any worthwhile portion of this money, say one sixth or half a million dollars, would be a very desirable circulation of ready money in this province.

It must be clear to all concerned, Mr. Murley continued, that an increase in tourist traffic means an increase in business and is worth while going after in a big way. It is equally true that many considerations which may arise, foreign to local routine, where the tourist or stranger in our midst should be able to look for and receive at the hands of our people all the mortals and considerations so freely provided in any city where overtures are made for this business.

Other speakers included His Worship Mayor P. W. Turner who proposed, Mr. Justice A. E. Arsenault, Coun. E. A. Foster, R. E. Mutch, Coun. George MacLeod, Coun. H. F. VanDerstine, W. S. Grant, L. D. Murray, W. A. Gaudet, Coun. A. A. Hennessey.

There were three courses open to the City Council, Mr. Justice Arsenault pointed out. Put the rest room in the north end of the building as the Council proposed, put it in the west end as advocated by the Travel Bureau, or postpone the construction operations to see if a better plan could be arrived at.

The delegation was not waiting on the City Council in an attempt to stampede it but to see how visitors to Charlottetown could best be accommodated. Cities all over Canada were expending money to attract tourists, Mr. Justice Arsenault said.

Mayor Turner said he believed that every member of the City Council was in accord with what the Judge said. There was one angle in the matter, however, that must not be overlooked and that was that under the new proposal the Market Building was invested in the City as a market house. In making any change that fact must be kept in mind by the Council. The Council had considered the matter carefully and from all angles but that was the situation it was up against.

Conditions had changed greatly in the past 25 or 40 years, Justice Arsenault said. And the building was not used as a market to the extent it was in former years. In his opinion the plan as proposed by the Travel Bureau would not interfere in any way with the market activities.

He had been impressed with the plan as proposed by the Travel Bureau. Coun. Foster told the meeting the original plan had been postponed until the new proposal could be considered but a good deal of outside opposition had developed. A rest room in the west end would not interfere with market farmers or business houses, Mr. E. Mutch declared. It would be a grave mistake to place toilet and rest room facilities in the Market Building without proper supervision, the speaker believed.

Closes Plants In Face Of Strike

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) CHARLOTTETOWN, Ont., June 21---On instructions from J. A. O'Brien, General Manager of the M. J. O'Brien Company the plants of Renfrew Woolen Mills Ltd., at Renfrew and Carleton Place are to be closed down. This was the company's answer to the refusal of strikers to accept the Renfrew plan to return to work tomorrow without the pay increases they sought.

Some 400 employees at the two plants will be affected by the shut-down. Employees at the Renfrew plant went on strike Saturday seeking wage increases and the directors of the company refused claiming it was impossible to increase wages under present conditions.

Mayor Turner pointed out that the matter had been under consideration for many years and that the Council had not decided to act without due consideration to all angles.

Forty Enrolled At St. Dunstan's Short Course

Forty young men enrolled at the agriculture short course which opened at St. Dunstan's University yesterday. Classes will occupy two weeks and will include instruction in purely agriculture subjects and lectures on leadership, soil analysis, co-operative principles, credit unions, farm book keeping, home making, and education. Dr. M. M. Coady of the extension department of St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, will lecture on leadership and Mr. James McIntyre, Moncton, will give instruction in soil analysis. Other lecturers will include officials from the Federal and Provincial Departments of Agriculture. Several afternoons will be spent on the College, Falconwood and Experimental Farms, where classes will be supervised by agriculture experts. Saturday morning will be spent in Davis and Fraser's packing plant where the short course students will see hog grading demonstrations.
