Firm Stand Being Taken to Combat Miners' Demands

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Feb. 28.—Anthracite operators intend taking a firm stand in opposing the demands of the part of the miners for increased wages and other changes in working conditions, formulated last Saturday at an all-day session.

This fact developed at today's session of the policy committee of the Anthracite Association, which was brought together on an emergency call at the instance of Samuel D. Warriner, of Philadelphia, president of the Lehigh Coal and Navigation Company.

A letter strategy is fore-shadowed by the arbitrary position determined upon by the operators, unless the miners are more conciliatory in their attitude. Out of the conference information leaked out tonight that two big issues were taken up, which left no doubt as to the decision to accept war. One was the decision on an unopposed stand against the 20 per cent. increase in wages A. H. A. ruling that the Charlotte town-Sussex hockey game, last Wednesday which was protested by Sussex should not be replayed but should stand.

LONDON, February 2.—A crisis has arisen in the engineering industry, the employers' federation having given notice to the Amalgamated Engineering Union that a lockout of their members will be in operation after March 11. The dispute concerns the principle of freedom of management and the question of overtime. The lockout will be confined to the engineering industry and will not affect the shipping trades. Between 40 and 50 per cent. of the total number of men employed in the country's engineering shops numbering some 500,000 will be affected.

Will Reply Today

Charlton Warriner tonight refused to discuss the details of the programme to combat the miners' demands. He stated that the operators will make known their reply to the miners tomorrow.

PARIS, February 28.—In the next few days France may find herself involved in a diplomatic discussion over the repatriation of a German subject, who has been seen in the Fatherland, and who, according to her own declaration, does not wish to see it.

The subject in question is eight-year-old Marcelle Heymann, who was born in Nancy in 1914 of German parents, who upon the outbreak of the war were interned in a French family named Demange, neighbors of the interned Germans, realizing the hardships the infant faced, took her into their home. All parties concerned believed at the time the war would be a matter of a few months.
