MEETING OF THE PRESBYTERIAL

Held at Montague on Wednesday and Yesterday Interesting Sessions and Much Work Done.

In the lovely summer weather Conventions are in the air. The Presbyterian Society of P. E. I. met at Montague on Wednesday July 5th. The journey by rail afforded time for pleasant conversation and discussion of the coming work. Railroad and steamboat officials seemed to have conspired to aid the work by their consideration. Conductor Hibbert brought one car to the wharf where Capt. McLaren was waiting for delegates. Here all were kindly met by Miss Ella Cameron and Miss Jean Sinclair, Montague. The delegates had a most enjoyable trip up the beautiful Montague River. Friends were waiting and all were sorry to note so many disappointed faces. There were but seventeen, while forty were expected.

The greeting meeting was held on Wednesday morning. The church was beautifully decorated. The President Miss Muirhead, Summerside conducted the opening exercises and committees were appointed. An excellent original paper on "Prayer" was read by the Secretary Miss McNutt, Malpeque. Encouragements from the many promises were noted. The incoming of the Kingdom showed the dependence of our Missionaries on our earnest prayers. The Master's command and example and the entreaty of Paul for prayer should encourage us. We cannot all give but we all can pray.

Roll call showed 27 delegates present. After a short discussion on Mission Band difficulties the Doxology was sung and the session rose. Wednesday afternoon session was opened by a Bible reading by Miss J. Muirhead, Summerside. After reading of minutes, the report of the work for the year was read by Miss McNutt. It was encouraging and suggestive. 17 auxiliaries have increased in membership. Little Sands heads the list with an increase of 15, next is Bloomfield. Cardigan has the largest average attendance. Zion Church takes the largest number of "The Message." Montague has the largest membership. Alberton gives the largest amount.

Mrs B. Rogers of Alberton then read the report of Young People's Work, Number of members 495, increase 150. Boys enrolled 117, increase 33. Funds received from Mission Bands \$183.33. Boxes have been sent to missionaries and a barrel of literature to Labrador. It was decided to have copies of both these reports sent to auxiliaries. The president gave an address of encouragement. Auxiliaries and Bands are urged to hold more thank offering meetings.

A helpful paper on "Thank offering" was read by Miss Miller of Dundas. Mrs (Dr) McNeill spoke of the importance of our Home Missions in the Northwest. A short discussion followed. The Treasurer Mrs Cairns, Charlottetown, then read her report. Dedicatory prayer was offered by Mrs Spencer.

An invitation to the picturesque grounds of (Mrs) Senator Robertson was accepted and the convention was photographed. Dinner and tea were served at the house. A public meeting was held in the evening. Rev. Mr. MacNeill, Orwell presided. Mr. Sinclair, the pastor, and Mr. Spencer assisted in opening exercises. Mr. MacNeill gave a brief but helpful address. The Mission Band gave a number of recitations and sang several hymns. Rev. Mr. Sedgewick, Charlottetown gave a stirring address, "God needs us." There are five ways of helping God: 1st Our life, 2nd Our lips (what we say), 3rd Our service (what we do), 4th What we give,

5th and strongest The Power of Prayer. Those who are praying most are doing most. Take time from important things to pray. The story of D. L. Moody's success was attributed to the prevailing prayers of an invalid. Owing to the time for closing drawing so near Rev. Mr. Smith of Cardigan excused himself from speaking. A solo from Rev. Mr. Sedgewick and the meeting closed.

On Thursday morning Mrs Spencer conducted the opening exercises. The Treasurer Mrs. Cairns reported \$183.31 received this year. Nominating Committee Miss Murdochson, Clyde River, Mrs. Spencer, Cove Head; Mrs. Dr. McNeill Charlottetown; Miss Woodside, Hamilton; Mrs. Grata, Alberton; Mrs. Toombs, Rustico; Miss Janet Muirhead, Summerside. There were passed resolutions of sympathy with the friends of the late Treasurer, Miss Annie Campbell, Mrs. Fred Paton and Miss Charlotte Montgomery. Resolutions of thanks were also passed to the Montague friends for their kind hospitality and to the railroad and steamboat companies for reduced rates. The next place of meeting is Alberton. The meeting closed with prayer.
