PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS OF THE SUMMERSIDE BOARD OF TRADE

The Business Review of the Year 1906 in the Western Capital, as Set Forth by the President at Annual Meeting of the Board

GENTLEMEN:—Since I had the privilege of addressing you one year ago this Board has suffered the loss of one of its most prominent and energetic members. The death of Mr. R. T. Holman created a vacancy in this Board not easily filled. Not only at this Board will the want of his presence be keenly felt but also in the more enlarged circle of the Town, County and Province.

His indomitable and well-regulated business energy was known and appreciated not only here but throughout the greater part of Canada and elsewhere. While the loss of this energy will be notable in business circles his successful career will be an incentive to others. The Town of Summerside had the misfortune to be visited by a disastrous conflagration. Not often has so relatively large an area been swept to ruins. It is pleasing to note however a determination to again rebuild, to profit by experience as evidenced by the steps already taken for the better protection of property against a recurrence of that disaster as well as to put the Town in a position, as to modern improvements, which added to the advantage of location will make it a place attractive to the tourist.

In the destruction of the Court House, offices and jail a question somewhat acute in its bearings has been brought to the front by a portion of the press agitating that the County jail be removed to Queen's County. I might dismiss this question by simply saying that Prince County will not tolerate such a move. It might be well to state that while it is recognized that the less a jail is required the better and it is pleasing to note that while this County jail is fortunately not much used yet for practical convenience it is necessary and must be continued. There is also another matter which has been long delayed but which should receive the active attention of our representatives. The land office as to the land in Prince County with all the plans books and deeds should be located in Summerside, under the control of the Registrar. There is every reason why this should be done and no valid reason can be assigned against it. Common sense points that the title records should be in the centre of the lands they concern.

The business and industrial life of this Province are closely identified with inter-provincial transportation which especially in winter is lamentably inefficient in equipment and this equipment is especially mismanaged. For the state of affairs the Dominion Government is to blame. Even if the present equipment was managed with merely a make-believe of a business effort some hope would be entertained by the people of something better coming.

Ignoring for the present all the undue strike-work put up on this question it must strike every reasonable man in the Province and who has to travel with or travel to or from this Province that the department concerned with the present equipment lay down a certain well-defined method and have it well known, which would avoid for the month of December at least all the confusion loss and annoyance which has heretofore accompanied this service.

Certain things about this service are known. It is known that the Stanley can run from Summerside to Cape Tormentine every year till the 1st of January at least. Why should not the department direct that the Stanley go on that route last of December or immediately on the Company's boat going off the Summerside route—not one day, two days or a week after—giving rise to so much unnecessary chagrin, loss and confusion—not at the discretion of the Captain but by the express direction of the Department, to be made well known so that all concerned would know for a certainty that this route would continue till 1st of January and also long after that as the Captain deemed the route practicable and let the Minto be under a like express direction from the department till such date as known conditions warrant. This will define principle of management would remove from traffic the tenuity of uncertainty for the month of December—the most important of the winter months—the fact equal to or more than equal to any two months later. This special advantage would follow, the importance of which cannot be too strongly emphasized, namely, that it would be known for a certainty that there would be transportation on the Stanley and Minto during all December and those engaged in differing lines would know and prepare for the uncertainties which under the present equipment may occur in January and February. I know that certain of the Press write itself into more or less of a frenzy because both boats do not at once go on the Charlottetown-Pictou route. I would ask why that route? Why that round about way? Does the trade and traffic want to go that way? How about the Steam Navigation Company which goes to do business where business is, where money

can be made! Where does the Company get its principal route? Not on the Charlottetown-Pictou route. Anything and everything in the way of pull should be eliminated from this winter communication. Let the request for certain well-defined methods be made to the Department. I may say in this connection that the usual recurring foolish cry of congestion of freight was in evidence this year as usual while at the same time the good ship Minto was leisurely making a single trip per day with about one-half a load, more or less, each trip. The method I have pointed out would undoubtedly systematize the service for the month most important and in the meantime a third and more powerful boat should be built and placed in the service without delay. I have purposely in this paper confined myself to the simple matter in this service which can be attended to without undue delay or cost and the prompt attention to which would indicate an earnestness on the part of the Dominion Government that our rights would receive punctual attention.

The cost of the winter inter-provincial transportation exceeds all reasonableness and should be adjusted. I have been shown instances where freight on goods landed here from Montreal and St. John costs 40% more than the same in summer. As to transportation by P. E. I. R. the most important is to have the excessive freight rates reduced. In other respects it seems to me that in arranging a timetable for winter with the present limitations of mileage too much attention has been paid to through passenger traffic. To give local accommodation to the County centres should be the leading principle in framing a winter-time-table. More attention should be given to quick transportation of perishable freight. Matters of this kind however could be more effectively dealt with by a committee from the Board. I merely here make this casual suggestion.

In laying down the office of President of this Board I bespeak for my successor the same watchful attention to various matters as it has been my pleasure to experience with you, gentlemen. Yours respectfully, NEIL McQUARRIE.

New York, Jan. 14.—Eight tunnel workers fought for life last night 100 feet below the surface of the earth in a caisson of the Hudson Tunnel Company's terminal at Fulton and Church Streets. Below them was a fountain of murky water, rapidly filling the narrow chamber in which they had been at work. Above them was a tightly closed air lock.

Through this lock only one man could go at a time. Each wanted to be the first to escape the inrush of water. Everyone of the eight was injured in the fight on the ladder leading to the opening.

One man reached the air-lock. Two men seized him by the legs and pulled him into the water. Two more fe on top of them and for a moment things looked serious. For fifteen minutes the men fought, finally being rescued, bruised, but not seriously hurt.

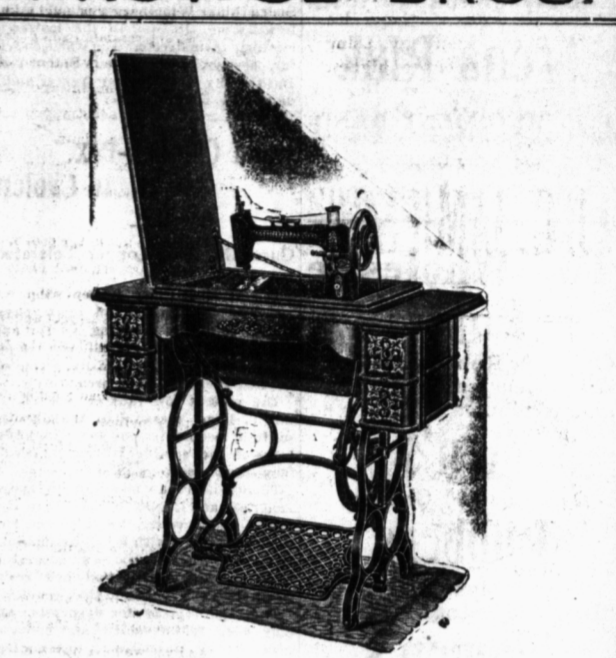
