ANOTHER AIR MAIL RECORD ESTABLISHED

OTTAWA, Aug. 3.—(By The Canadian Press)—Another Canadian air mail record was chalked up to the postal service of this country today when letters mailed in London at 2 o'clock on Saturday afternoon, were delivered today in Montreal, and in Ottawa before 6 p. m. for Montreal the elapsed time was three days and 22 hours, and for Ottawa four days and five hours.

The last leg of the trip from Belle Isle to Ottawa, that from St. Hubert Airforce, was flown in a driving rainstorm. Despite this hindrance, however, Flight-Lieut. Harding and Johnston of the Royal Canadian Air Force, made the 'hop' in one hour and 12 minutes.

The Empress of Britain will dock at Quebec on Thursday, and ordinary mail will not be delivered in Ottawa until Friday morning. Today's load consisted of 685 pounds of letters and small packages.

Odd Surcharge

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Aug. 3.—(By The Canadian Press)—Some of the most interesting postage stamps issued in recent years—from the collector's point of view—have come out of Newfoundland.

Carl A. House of Carbonnair claims to have a block of four DO-X stamps with an inverse surcharge on them.

The ordinary unused varieties have changed hands at different prices, ranging from cents to dollars.

One local collector, signing "C. A. E." wants to know how the inverse surcharge occurred, and he suggests a government investigation to find out.

Women Urged To Watch Cancer

MELBOURNE, Australia, Aug. 3.—(By The Canadian Press)—The seriousness of the problem of cancer in Australia was the subject of addresses given by Dr. W. J. Cusack and Professor Marshall Allan to members of the National Council of Women. The urgent need for the public to realize the importance of early notification of any possible symptom of cancer, which is at present the second most common cause of death among civilized peoples, was emphasized by both speakers.

The death rate, Dr. Cusack said, had been steadily rising in all civilized countries. In Australia in 1900 mortality was 60 in every 100,000 of the mean population. In 1930 it had risen to 95. At the Women's Hospital more than 60 per cent of the women who came first for treatment were advanced cases, who had they come earlier might have been promised a 70 per cent cure.

The National Council is supporting the Victorian Medical Women's Society in its desire to retain the present system of boarding state wards in roster homes in preference to the institutional system.

Bible Schools Largely Attended

TORONTO, Aug. 4.—(By The Canadian Press)—Great success has attended this year's session of the Daily Vacation Bible Schools. Nearly 10,000 children have attended the schools, Miss Mary Eadie, the organizing convener, said.

Some of the schools have had an enrolment of more than 325 and nearly all have had an average attendance of more than 150. The response has been most gratifying. She paid tribute to the co-operation of the Federation for Community Service, with which the schools are affiliated. The public health nurses, she said, visited all the schools and gave every child a health examination each week.

"Then the police had been wonderfully kind in helping the little folk across crowded streets. "We can report that not a child has been lost or injured and all have been very happy," Miss Eadie said.
