PROHIBITION CASE.—Yesterday the case of Allan Bolner vs. Arthur McKinnon of Glenadale was heard before Duncan Edgar Shaw and Arthur I. Clark, two Justices of the Peace for Queen's County, for breach of the Prohibition Act. This was the first case to be tried in Queen's County under the amendment passed last session whereby the Office of County Stipendiary Magistrates was abolished. Before the case was proceeded with Mr. George S. Inman, K. C., on behalf of the defendant raised the following questions, (among others) in regard to jurisdiction: 1. That under the new amendment two Justices of the Peace have no jurisdiction to try a case under the Prohibition Act, 1900. 2. 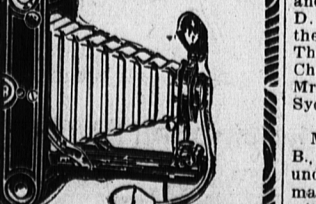
