**THE NATIONAL SERVICE LEAGUE.**—Meets in the Assembly Room tonight at eight o'clock. Important business. 390

**ALL EMPLOYERS OF LABOUR.**—are reminded of the Conference tonight in the Assembly Room with the National Service League. Large attendance requested. 390

**RAILWAY CONSTRUCTION DRAFT.**—Lieut. W. A. McDonald, Wheatley River has been authorized to raise a draft of fifty men for Railway construction work.

**JOINS AERIAL LEAGUE.**—Word has been received that George N. Milford, the first from this province to enlist in the Dominion Branch of the Aerial League has successfully passed his examinations in Montreal, and has been ordered to join the corps in Toronto.

**THE MAILED.**—Owing to the hold-up at Point du Chene on account of ice and the uncertainty as to when the Northumberland can move out, the mails are being sent today to Cape Traverse, where they will be taken by motor boat to Cape Tormentine. The mails delayed at Point du Chene will be brought over this evening by the Capes route.

**FULLY RECOVERED.**—Mr. William Hamm or Bunbury, Lot 48, received a telegram yesterday, stating that his son, Lieut. Charles Boyer Hamm, infantry, is reported "no longer seriously ill" in St. John's Ambulance Brigade, Etaples. This is the young man whose medal for bravery was referred to in yesterday's Guardian. His many friends will be glad to learn that he has fully recovered from his wounds.

## S.S. ARANMORE HERE AND IDLE

The steamer Aranmore arrived in Charlottetown yesterday about 1:30. The intention was to begin loading on once for Pictou. The longshoremen refused to proceed with the loading on the terms previously agreed to for the loading of the Car Ferry. In this agreement they were to load the Car Ferry at the rate of 60 cents a ton. In the case of the Aranmore, the longshoremen demanded 40 cents an hour for day work and 45 cents for night work. Superintendent Grady informed the men that the General Superintendent was on his way to Montreal and could not be communicated with. He, however, informed the men that he would submit their offer to him at the earliest opportunity, and would recommend his favourable consideration. This, the men refused to accept.

The President and several members of the Board of Trade, learning of the affair interviewed the men, and after considerable discussion under took to guarantee the longshoremen the difference between the Railway's offer and their demand. Finally, the men accepted this offer and agreed to go to work at once. They went to work somewhat late last night, but after about ten minutes' work some of the men refused to go on. The others followed and work on the Aranmore was ceased.

The longshoremen also notified Mr. Grady that their agreement with the Car Ferry for 60 cents an hour will terminate next Saturday. The matter stood thus at a late hour last night, and the long expected arrival of the Aranmore has by this unfortunate turn of affairs proved a disappointment to those who have produce to ship and goods to import.

It was reported late last night that the Aranmore will proceed to Summerside, where there are seventy cars of freight awaiting transportation owing to the blockade at Pt. du Chene by ice. The intention is to proceed from Summerside to Pictou, the strait east of Summerside being clear of ice.

It will be unfortunate, indeed, if through any cause Charlottetown is deprived of its much needed steamer, a misfortune that is now a probability.

**SCHOOL BOARD MEETING.**—A meeting of the City School Board was held at 8 o'clock last evening. There were present, Messrs. J. P. Gordon, Dr. Jenkins, W. K. Rogers, Dr. McMillan. In the absence of Mr. Smith, Dr. Jenkins was appointed chairman. It was decided that Arbor Day and Empire Day be celebrated on 23rd May. The following visiting committees were appointed: Prince St., Mr. Smith; West Kent, Mr. Johnston; Queen Square, Mr. Rogers; Rockford Square, Dr. Jenkins.

**AUTOMOBILE REGULATIONS.**—A meeting of automobile owners and chauffeurs was held in the Board of Trade Room last evening, extending to 11 o'clock. Regulations for the running of automobiles were discussed at considerable length, and it was stated that the Government had adopted rules of great stringency, which would be published at an early date. It was resolved to get members of the Association to sign certain additional restrictions which would be binding for a limited period.

## BRITISH DESTROYER STRIKES A MINE

One officer and 61 men are missing and are presumed to have been drowned.

## NATIONALISTS WIN IN AUSTRALIA HUGHES RE-ELECTED

The complexion of the Senate has not been determined by the first returns. Premier Hughes was re-elected to the House.

## LABOR REPRESENTATIVES DEMAND SETTLEMENT OF IRISH QUESTION

LONDON.—Powerful representations are about to be made to Lloyd George and the Cabinet by representatives of labor as to their view to the imperative urgency of a settlement of the Irish question, the Pall Mall Gazette understands.

It is generally understood, adds the newspaper, that unless a satisfactory settlement is quickly arrived at the labor members of the government may be compelled to reconsider their position.

He crossed to England with the 154th Battalion in Sept. 1914 and twenty eight days after they landed the draft in which he was included was sent to France.

**CORPL. CHARLES BENTLY**

Mr. W. E. Bentley, K.C., received a telegram yesterday stating that his brother Corpl. Charles Bentley, infantry, was officially reported admitted to 2nd Canadian Stationary Hospital, Boulogne, on April 30th, severe gunshot wound in shoulder. Corpl. Bentley formerly lived in Kensington but has been for several years in Western Canada. He enlisted in Calgary.

## UNITED STATES RESPONSE TO LIBERTY LOAN

Money Paured in at Rate of Twenty Million Dollars an Hour. Offers Already Amount to \$138,675,000.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)  
WASHINGTON.—Subscriptions to the liberty loan poured into the Treasury Department today at the rate of nearly \$20,000,000 an hour. The greatest outpouring of national wealth in the history of the world was foreshadowed by the first days response to the offering of the loan. Offers of subscription to the loan amount to \$138,675,000.

## HAITI WANTS TO FIGHT GERMANY

PORT-AU-PRINCE.—President E. Artigue has sent a message to the Senate and Chambers of Deputies in Congress demanding a declaration of war against Germany, and a commission has been appointed to consider the question.

## SERIOUS REVOLTS OCCUR IN BERLIN

(Canadian Press Despatch.)  
AMSTERDAM.—The Haasbode of Maasricht says that serious revolts occurred in Berlin last week. According to the paper the mob became so menacing that machine guns were used against it. The story is not confirmed from any other sources.

## AN IMPERIAL ZULU.

Few incidents, writes the Christian Science Monitor, have frustrated more forcibly the enormous strides made by South Africa towards settling its great "native question" than the recent appointment, by General Botha, of Cetewayo's grandson to the position of Government administrator for the Zulu tribes. South Africa would seem to be the home for courageous and successful experiments. General Botha was simply following the example of "trust" set by Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, some ten years ago. When General Botha sent Solomon, the son of Dinizulu, and the grandson of Cetewayo, to take over his new office, he made it clear to Solomon that he was not being sent "to raise military kraals or impi's," but to establish peace amongst the Zulu people. It is not likely that the South African Premier will be disappointed.

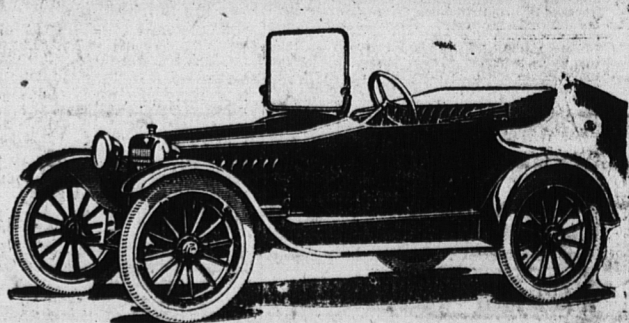
