Ancient Document Provides Free Tuition At Acadia

HALIFAX, Jan. 16 — (CP) — Through a legal instrument a hand long dead reached out to Acadia University at Wolfville, N. S., today in an attempt to compel the college to honor a certificate of free tuition issued 70 years ago.
Background of probably the strangest writ ever issued in Nova Scotia was a donation of £100 to "Acadia College" in 1833 and upon which the University issued in 1878 a perpetual certificate of free tuition to heirs of the donor, Isaac Turner.
The writ was issued today by R. Graham Murray and filed on behalf of P. W. F. Brewster, retired magistrate of Saint John, N. B., and grandson of Isaac Turner.
The writ claimed that under the certificate Turner's heirs were entitled to "the exclusive right to claim forever the free tuition of one scholar at Acadia College (now Acadia University) and for damages for the refusal of the defendant corporation to supply free tuition to scholars appointed by the plaintiff as legal owner of the said certificate."
