TASMAN SHARK KILLS BATHER

BRISBANE, Australia Dec. 14 — Norman Girvan, 18, was killed and Jack Brinkley, 15, friend, badly mauled by a shark while they were swimming in the Tasman Sea with other youths at Kirra Beach, near here. Brinkley's arm was amputated in hospital. The hero of the tragedy was Joe Doniger who gallantly swam to the aid of his fellow-bathers. Brinkley called out, "For God's sake hurry up," and then collapsed. The shark was still circling near by, but Doniger brought Brinkley to shore with the murderous fish stabbing the victim's leg. Doniger made an effort also to assist Girvan. His hand, however, encircled a terrible wound made by the shark and he had to release the body which was afterwards washed to shore.
