TORONTO Globe 21st says: Special evangelistic services were conducted by Messrs. Crossley and Hunter in Elm Street Methodist Church last evening, and a large congregation was in attendance. Mr. Crossley preached a sermon on "The Crowns of the Bible." An impressive song service was given, and Mr. Hunter led in the service of prayer which followed. The services will continue all week.

MR. CHARLES A. ARCHIBALD, the proprietor of Bellevue Stock Farm, Colchester, has recently been to P. E. Island to purchase stock. He reports good stock rather scarce on the Island, or at least they want at present to keep all they have. He, however, made purchase of three good Ayrshire Bulls, which he brought with him. It is seldom that such stock is brought from the Island so early in the season.

In referring to "P. E. Island politics" the St. John Globe says: "Now, it is rumored, and accepted as true, that Mr. Wise will not accept his seat in the Assembly at the approaching session, as he will be appointed to a government office. There will also be another vacant chair, according to the opposition press, it being alleged that Mr. J. A. Pineau, an opposition member, will not attend the session in consequence of his appointment as assistant fruit inspector at the Paris exposition. The Dominion government was questioned in the Senate, on Thursday, as to Mr. Pineau's appointment, but it was officially denied that Mr. Pineau was on the list of the exposition officials. It appears to be certain, however, that the gentleman in question has been provided for by somebody in some way and that he will not attend the legislative meetings. Premier Farquharson will, therefore, be a little better off than it seemed at first he would be. It is expected the Legislature will meet in a few weeks, and interesting developments are expected."
