HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 2—Perfect weather today and record crowd attended exhibition and races in which the wise ones were all disappointed as in every race a dark horse won out.

In the 2.25 trot and pace, there were twelve starters, Ginger and May Daniels were picked as favorites. Although Ariel Wood started in the second tier he soon forced his way to the front and was never headed.

In the 2.15 trot and pace, Mary Cromwell was the favorite. Oswego Boy, owned by Victor Douse, won by a nose in every heat and lowered his mark to 2.15, this giving him the honor of being the fastest green pacer this year in New England—States and the Maritime Provinces.

Oswego Boy won his race on Friday as well. The 2.20 trot was the greatest surprise to the thousands present. Briar Queen, four years old, owned by H. Ledyard, won the second heat in 2.18, breaking the Maritime record for the four-year-old trotters held by Brazilian for so many years. 
