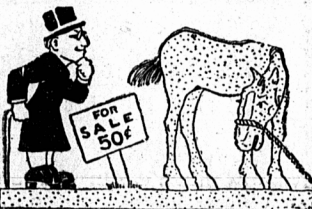

ARE COURAGEOUS UNDER WAR STRAIN.

PARIS, January 12.—The French people are enduring the emotional shock and strain of the war well, said Professor Anatole Chaffard, a prominent member of the French today at the Academy.

Normal persons, he declared, had adapted themselves courageously to the agonies and uncertainties, which have not broken up all their customary habits of thought, action and feeling; but in the case of certain emotional subjects, the emotional shock had resulted in mental confusion and excitement, or in depression, and these attacking the nervous instability had produced grave disorders. The early closing of wine shops and cafes, the prohibition of the sale of absinthe, and physical education professor Chaffard said, were among the things which explained the strength of the race supporting the shock and these, he contended, would also contribute to the restoration of the birthright and the moral and physical condition of the country.

CANADIAN UNITS WILL GO TO THE FRONT

LONDON, December 23.—(Correspondence)—Part of the Canadian contingent, which has been under a course of training on Salisbury Plain is now on the firing line, or somewhere near it, but that the men have been able to show their fighting qualities in the trenches in Northern France, has not yet been announced.

Princess Patricia's regiment, largely composed of men who have seen previous service, entrained a few days ago for Southampton where they embarked for a French port. They are to be followed by the Scottish regiments of the contingents and later by other units, some of which have been attached to British regiments.

It was hoped that when the contingent arrived the Canadians would form an army of their own but being composed as it is of men who have had experience in the arts of warfare and raw recruits, this was found impracticable unless the contingent was to remain in England for an indefinite time.

GO FORWARD AS READY.

Now they are being sent out as they become eligible under the direction of experienced British officers and will take their places in the line with British regiments of similar character. They will not, however, lose their individuality as they will be known as the "Canadian Units" of such regiments as they become part of and in time the main body will go as the "Canadian Contingent."

The men have had a hard time of it on Salisbury Plain, but there has been little grumbling. With transport motors and wagons passing all the time the camp has been turned into a field of mud, while the weather, a damp cold that pierces to the bone, has proved trying to men used to the dry, bracing atmosphere of Canada. Hard work has been the rule. Men who came over with the idea that they were to be sent to the front, immediately have nevertheless huddled down to the routine drill that tries the patience of all.

ALDERSON PLEASED.

Major-General Alderson, in command of the contingent, speaks highly of the results attained since the contingent went into camp in England. He has had some unusual conditions to deal with such as the apparent lack of discipline, which arises more from close comradeship of officers and men than any disrespect for the officers' uniform. This has all been overcome and the general is as proud of his army as any other British commander.

LONDON, January 12.—Headquarters number two Hospital, Canadian Contingent, has been moved permanently. It is understood the entire hospital will be moved as the health of the patients improve.

There have been several cases of spinal meningitis among the troops.

The floods in the Salisbury district are now decreasing, and the Cathedral is being pumped out. Streets surrounding Bulford Hospital have been under a foot of water but there seems promise of a spell of sharp weather, and things will doubtless improve shortly.
