Prince Edward Island lost one of its most distinguished sons, Donald O. Stewart, an outstanding citizen, in the death yesterday morning at his home, 1 Grafton Street, Charlottetown, of the Hon. John Alexander Mathieson, Premier during his illness in the latter Chief Justice of the Province for more than two decades. Death came at the age of eighty-four after a brief illness, and after less than four years' retirement from active life.

Prominent for fifteen years before his appointment to the Bench, both as Opposition leader and Premier, Mr. Mathieson's calibre as a statesman was recognized far beyond the bounds of his native Province. On many occasions his counsel and assistance were sought at Ottawa. Under his administration the vital interests of the Province affecting transportation, education, agriculture and finance were improved, and the door opened for further recognition of Island claims at Ottawa under the terms of Confederation.

When he became Chief Justice of the Province in 1917, Mr. Mathieson followed in the footsteps of a long line of able jurists. His one-year tenure of the office only upheld the dignity and high reputation of his predecessors but added a personal charm which won for him the enduring affection of his citizens.

Mr. Mathieson retired from the Bench on March 31, 1943, being succeeded as Chief Justice by the then Premier and Attorney General, Hon. Thane A. Campbell, LL.D. On that occasion he was pointed to the Bench by the members of the Legislature by the Judiciary and Bar, and presented with addresses warmly expressing the honour and esteem in which he was held.

Mr. Mathieson possessed a mastery style, and could sum up, sometimes in a few words, an involved legal statement or the weak points in a political opponent's argument in such a manner as to carry complete conviction.

On Dec. 9, 1945, Mrs. Mathieson passed away, and from this loss of a beloved helpmate and intimate friend, Mr. Mathieson never fully recovered.

Five children were born of the union, one of whom, Louise, died in infancy. The surviving children are: Mr. David L. Mathieson, K.C., LL.B., Charlottetown; Helen, Mrs. Frank B. Chauvin, Montreal; Mrs. Dora Eleanor Campbell, Charlottetown; and Avila, Mrs. Thomas B. Rogers, Charlottetown. All of whom sympathize is extended.

The funeral will be held on Thursday from St. James Church, service starting at 2 o'clock. Interment will be in Sherwood cemetery.
