SAVES CODFISH TRADE

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 6.—(CP)—Newfoundland's salt codfish industry, worth \$8,000,000 annually, has weathered the crisis posed by Britain's suspension of the convertibility of sterling through use of the island's accumulated surpluses in London.

During the war U.N.R.R.A. purchases sent Newfoundland codfish into countries which it had never reached before and exporters had hoped to hold these markets in peacetime.

With the industry facing collapse and fishermen expecting heavy losses, the people of Newfoundland were bewildered by the sudden closing of one of their chief outlets for fish by Britain's action until W. E. Ffian, commissioner of natural resources, stepped to a microphone in a St. John's radio station.

He announced that the \$30,000,000 kitty piled up by Newfoundland during prosperous war years

would be exchanged for the sterling which was paid to Newfoundland exporters and the sterling held on Newfoundland's behalf in London where the island has a debt of \$78,000,000.

LONDON, Nov. 6.—(Reuters)—Next Wednesday will be budget day for Britain, when the country will learn from the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Hugh Dalton, what further anti-inflation financial burdens it will have to bear to speed economic recovery.

Four Dead, Up To 50 Injured In London Fog

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, Nov. 6.—At least four persons were believed killed and between 40 and 50 others injured in three train crashes in the London suburbs tonight during Britain's heaviest fog in 15 months.

Fog reduced visibility to near zero over a wide section of the country extending from the industrial Midlands to the South Coast, forcing the automobile traffic to a standstill and causing cancellation of bus service in North and East London.

In the Hopsur Park area where one of the train collisions occurred, men with flashlights preceded ambulances crawling to the scene of the crash. Three passengers still were trapped in the wreckage of the coaches late tonight, but it was not known whether they were dead.

At the scene of another train accident near Herne Hill on the main line to the South Coast, fire engines and ambulances stood by as rescue teams worked in the glare of searchlights and oil flares dimmed by fog. One man was believed killed and 17 others injured there when the locomotive of one train struck the rear section of an eight-coach train at a crossing.

A third and less serious train crash occurred near London's Euston Station.
