

MEETING OF THE INSTITUTES

Held Recently In Various Country Districts

Reports Show the Institutes to be Flourishing and the Means of Much Improvement to the Farmer, Officers Elected.

The Annual meeting of Union Institute, Abram's Village, took place at Wellington Station a few days ago. The year just past has been the most successful in its history. A marked improvement is everywhere noticeable in the live stock in this vicinity. Many meetings were held in different parts of the community during the year besides those addressed by Government lecturers, making the educational part excellent indeed. The Sec'y. submitted the report of the Directors along with the yearly accounts, which showed that the Institute was in good financial standing. Said report and statement was approved by the members present. L. A. Arsenault was chosen auditor. A Board of nine Directors were elected for incoming year from which the following officers were subsequently chosen.

Samuel S. Edge, President. E. E. Arsenault, Vice-President. H. A. Darby, Secy. Treas.

The free discussion of the different subjects before the meeting was conducted in a courteous manner, which goes to show that harmony and good will exist among the members of Union Institute.

The East Point Institute held its fourth annual session at Kingsboro on the 29th ult.

L. McDonald, President opened the meeting with a neat speech, in which he made reference to the work done by the Society, in the importation of the best quality of seed, and improved stock, also the educational advantages, by which we are brought in touch with the most advanced thought along agricultural lines.

The reports of the Secretary and Treasurer showed the Institute to be in a healthy condition, having ninety seven members on the roll, improving over \$800.00 worth of seed, and placing \$107.00 worth of improved stock during the year and a good balance to credit.

The next regular educational meeting will be held at St. Columba and local meetings at Bayfield and Elnora. Directors for incoming year are:

The evening session was addressed by T. S. Robertson, describing the different qualities of seed and impressing the necessity of having the best, which was not often possible before. He also showed the advantage of having the roadside nicely leveled and fenced (preferably with wire) and planted with rows of trees, also improving and painting farm buildings, and greater neatness in the farm yards etc.

L. McDonald spoke on the benefits and profit of clover; the necessity of sowing plenty seed and the reseedling in the early spring when the ketch was not good or was winter killed. Alex Scott showed the importance and independence of the farmer.

The annual meeting of Alberton Farmers Institute was held in the Court House on Nov. 18th at 2 p. m. There was quite a large attendance of the members. President Wm. McArthur occupied the chair.

The Sec'y Treasurer's report showed the financial standing of the Institute. After all expenses were paid there is in the hands of the Treasurer the sum of \$86.00 which is to be laid out in the purchase of more pure bred stock.

Directors—Andrew Wells, James Wilkie, James Hardy, Thomas Barbour, C. A. Woodman, Alexander Matthews. 140 tons of hay have been asked for which it is hoped the Government will be able to supply.

The meeting of Dunk River Institute was held at Lower Freetown Hall on Saturday Dec. 3rd. Notwithstanding the bad state of the roads there was a good attendance.

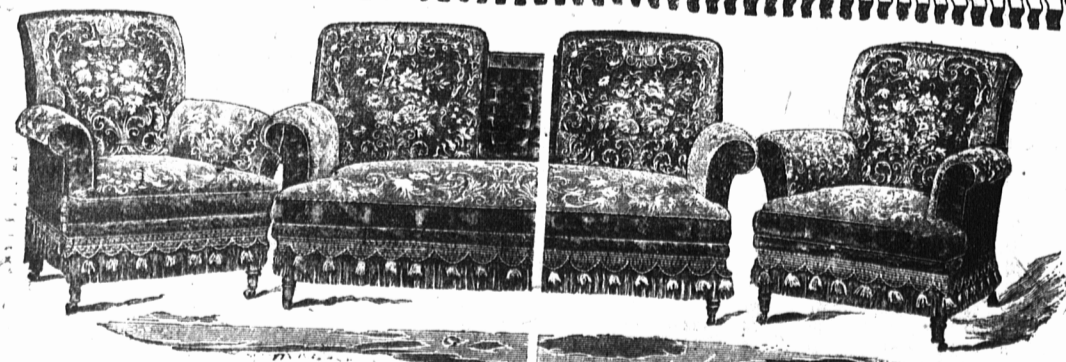
