ment for photo-finish so it is not cannot be made from an advertised purse for any reason whatsoever. It appears that in certain obligatory. This year deductions parts of the U.S. it had grown to be a racket and to head it off it is now the rule that all advertised purses must be paid in full, less any deductions which the track may make such as five percent or three percent or whatever it is. This does not prevent horsemen from making contributions to their own accounts to any worthwhile project they favor.

Rule 25. Add a new section to read: "Section 4. No owner, trainer, driver, agent, employee or attendant shall bet or cause any other person to bet on his behalf on any other horse in any race in which a horse owned, trained or driven, or which he in anywise represents or handles, or is handled in the same stable in which he is connected or employed, shall start. Any violation of this section shall be punished by fine, suspension or expulsion."

Charley Mills, leading European trainer for the past thirty years, is visiting the United States and is at present at Santa Anita where he was shaking hands with such old friends as Sep-Palm and Dr. Parahall. Mr. Mills imported a number of famous horses into Germany in bygone years, notably Walter Dear, 3, 2,028, winner of the 1929 Hambletonian Stake; Calumet, Bush 201; Sturdy, 2, 2,044, that had set a world's record of 2,064 over the Reading, Pa., half-mile track - then the world's record for a two-year-old. Both Sturdy and Walter Dear became good sires in Germany; Walter Dear's best trotter was Missouri, that won a lot of stakes there. When Mr. McLure and the writer visited Europe in 1926 we saw Charley Mills drive several horses to victory at the Tempelhof race track. There was no doubt about it, he had it over the other drivers and of course with his reputation probably got the best horses.

He raced horses in Berlin during the war but transferred his stable to Paris Vincennes track for the winter season of 1947-1948. He won fifty-five races there. His stay in Santa Anita is indefinite as after seeing several races he will return east to take in the Roosevelt Raceway events. Afterwards he expects to buy some horses to take over for racing and also some to head stock farms in France and Italy. He states that the ban on bringing or sending money out of the countries makes it very difficult to get sufficient funds with which to buy horses. The French brother Mistrero 3,00 by the ex-American sire Prince Hall 2,004 is expected to race at Roosevelt and other tracks this season. He showed very prominently at Vincennes January race meet.
