PEOPLE OF HARBIN WARMLY GREET RUSSIAN REFUGEES

HARBIN, Manchuria, Aug. 16.—Five sturdy Russian peasants, remnants of General Dieterich's last small band of "Whites" who stood out against the Bolsheviks at Vladivostok until the decisive battle that settled the fate of that town, drifted into Harbin one night recently, having run the gauntlet of Chinese bandits from Kirin, 300 miles away.

The experiences of these refugees were typical of those of thousands who were broadcast when the anti-Bolshevik campaign in Siberia finally failed. When the Russian wanderer arrived on the beach of the broad Sungari river where the Chinese Eastern railway crosses, connecting Moscow with the Pacific Ocean, was crowded with holiday makers from Harbin.

The holiday crowd drew nearer and watched the five occupants of the boat as they unloaded their belongings, meanwhile plying them with questions. It soon became known the strange travelers were from Kirin, and they were given a warm welcome.

For eighteen days they had drifted down the river from that place through a bandit infested region, headed for Harbin, the

only Russian city not under Bolshevik rule. They hope here to find some means of earning a living until better days, when they may return to their own country.

RENEW BATTLE FOR FREE SEEDS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—A vigorous campaign to force Congress again to provide an appropriation for distribution of free seeds is now being waged throughout the country.

Since July, when the new agriculture appropriation bill became effective without provision for seed distribution, many Congressmen have been besieged by constituents urging them to make an effort to have the provision restored to the bill.

"When Congress convenes, I again will introduce my bill making the seed distribution permanent law. This will stop all further fighting and quibbling over the proposition. I will press the measure for passage so that the people may get the seeds in time for spring planting, otherwise they will have to wait until next July, when the 1925 agriculture bill becomes effective."

Every year when the agriculture bill comes up in the House, Langley offers the free seed amendment and after fiery parliamentary discussion and heated debate it usually squeezes through by a bare majority. Last year

Langley carried on an intensive campaign for the adoption of his amendment, but it was defeated by one vote. This resulted in the people not having free seeds from their Congressmen for the first time since 1870.

RICHMOND SWINE BREEDERS ASSOCIATION ORGANIZED

The swine breeders of Richmond and upper Wellington have taken an important forward step in the improvement of their type of hog to meet the market demands.

To accomplish this purpose they have organized a Local Swine Breeders Association, or club, through which they hope to work co-operatively in obtaining high class breeding stock, and in marketing their hogs for slaughter.

This move of the farmers of Richmond is worthy of imitation by other swine breeding districts on the Island.

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The principal incident for which the men are held was the appropriation of the Meaford Police Chief's car. The chief sought to retain possession of his machine by running from his house in night attire and by leaping upon the running board. Threats by a revolver in the hands of the thieves, however forced him to abandon his idea of preventing their escape.

Since this incident the entire Meaford neighborhood has been aroused and residents have formed armed parties with a view to capturing the men. At 3.30 this afternoon William Metcalfe, an 83-year-old farmer reported that he had seen two men enter the bush on his property about 20 miles out of town. The place was surrounded and as the man finally came out at 8.30 in the evening, they were taken in charge by a provincial police constable aided by two private citizens. They were apparently between the age of 25 and 30. They denied any ability to drive a motor car. The chief's car, abandoned because of engine deflection was found in the vicinity in which the two suspects were discovered.

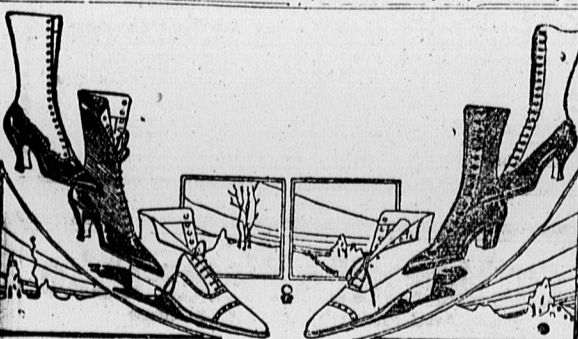
