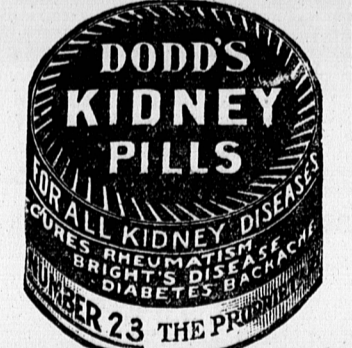

SCOTLAND FEELS TOO MUCH RULED FROM ENGLAND

EDINBURGH, April 8.—Lord Pentland the Secretary for Scotland, son-in-law of Lord Aberdeen, who was well known in Canada in the days of that Governor-General, as Captain Sinclair, has just paid a visit to the Scottish capital, where he gave some excellent advice on the housing and social problems. The occasion was seized by the people of the principal cities to make him acquainted with Scottish opinion on several important questions affecting the interests of the community of which he is the special guardian.

One of the grievances ventilated was the constitution of the Scottish Fishery Board. There is undoubtedly a strong feeling among the various branches of the fishing industry that they do not get into such close and sympathetic touch with this official authority as they should. The claim was put forward that the fish-curers should be specially represented on the Board. Why they should not be it is difficult to say. They are a very large and important section of the industry and are in a position to advise and to judge on the larger as well as the smaller matters of legislation or administration.

Again, we find the Caithness Fishermen's Association urging the reconstruction of the Board on a more representative basis, and expressing deep disappointment that no member had been selected from the important district of the North of Scotland. The Board if, of course, a nominated body—a bureaucratic authority to a large extent, and like all bureaucratic authorities, very difficult to get at.

The chief trouble, of course, in this as in other similar matters is that we are to all intents and purposes governed from London. In the Imperial Parliament neither the time nor the opportunity is afforded to go into all these matters with the minuteness and care which must be exercised if the best results are to be obtained. The consequence is there is continual grumbling, sometimes, it may be, we admit, without great cause, but all arising from the isolation of the authorities and the difficulty of bringing public criticism to play upon them.

The plain matter of fact is that we require devolution of Parliamentary work, and require it badly. Affairs at Westminster are actually now so seriously congested that Scotland cannot get passed such a simple measure as the House-Letting Bill. The old machine is no longer able to undertake the work that is thrown upon it. It has broken down exasperatingly under its burden. This, it must be remembered, is not a problem that will be solved by the passing of the Veto Bill.

WOMEN VICTIMS OF REBELS

CHIHUAHUA, Mex., April 16.—Forty or more insurgents were killed and over 100 wounded in a battle fought between Santa Clara and Santa Clara canon about 50 miles north of here, according to federal couriers who arrived today. The couriers brought orders to have hospital cots ready for the federal wounded.

The federals reported five killed, but later developments are expected to change the figures.

A number of women and children are believed to be among the killed. Coming across from Casas Grandes on their way to Chihuahua with prisoners, under General Luis Valdez, the federals, followed by about 100 refugees, were attacked.

Five hundred insurgents under General Orozco and Villa had been instructed by Francisco Madero to head off the Casas Grandes contingent and if possible capture and release the prisoners. The fight occurred on a hacienda as the prisoners, shackled together by ropes, and the women and children refugees weary from the long tramp, were scattered in a long broken line.

The federals immediately responded with a heavy fire and placed the prisoners and non-combatants under protection. The fighting continued several hours and resulted in the sending north from here of General Rabago with 500 reinforcements.

The extent of the fight became known when riderless horses arrived here with evidences of having left the front in a stampede. So far as is known, none of the prisoners, among whom are believed to be many Americans, were wounded, and none escaped, although these statements are based on unofficial reports.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., April 16.—The City Council of Atlanta has appropriated \$5,000 for the purpose of taking from the scrap iron pile the locomotive "Texas" that was used by the Confederates in capturing the "General" when the Andrews raiders attempted to burn the bridges between this city and Atlanta during the Civil War. The engine is to be partly repaired, moved to Grant Park and a building erected over it for its preservation as a war relic. The "General" is now housed in the Union Depot in this city.
