Australia
From Melbourne Prime Minister, J. A. Lyons of Australia, whose new cabinet has just been formed, sends this message: "May 1932 be marked in the history of British relations by the thoroughness of co-operation in the economic sphere between the various parts of the Empire. Common adversities are drawing us closer, and thus an unrivalled opportunity is presented for achieving a closer approach to real economic union which will lastingly benefit the British peoples. The new ministry will leave no stone unturned to make the Ottawa Conference a success. One of the first matters we will consider will be the question of adequate preparation for the economic conference."

New Zealand
From Wellington, Prime Minister G. W. Forbes, of New Zealand says: "Unemployment is still one of the greatest problems facing the nation and I appeal for a continuance of community effort to alleviate distress." A hopeful feature, he adds, was New Zealand's favorable overseas trade balance for the 11 months ended Nov. 30 last, in which period imports were over nine million pounds lower than the exports. He expressed the hope mutually advantageous arrangements would be effected as a result of the Ottawa Conference and other international conferences pending in 1932. "A satisfactory solution to the disarmament question, war debts, tariffs, reparations and kindred problems is one of the greatest moments to the world at present," Premier Forbes concluded.

This resolution said that in the absence of any satisfactory response from the government to the contrary, the committee will consider that the government has reduced the Delhi trade to nullity. In that event, the resolution summoned the country to resume not only civil disobedience but also non-payment of taxes, boycott of foreign clothes and picketing of liquor shops, and to begin again the unlicensed manufacture and collection of salt.

The resolution also contained a grim command to the followers of the congress that "if proceedings and demonstrations are organized, only those should join who will stand lathi (staff) charges and bullets without moving from their places."

The resolution rejected Prime Minister MacDonald's final declaration at the recent Round Table Conference as wholly unsatisfactory and inadequate.

"Nothing short of complete independence, carrying full control over defence, external affairs and finance, with such safeguards as may be demonstrably necessary in the interest of India, can be regarded by the Congress as satisfactory," the resolution said.

It demanded that the government institute an impartial public inquiry into the events leading up to repressive ordinances in various provinces. "You demand co-operation from the congress without returning any on behalf of the government," Mr. Gandhi said in his message to the Viceroy.

"I can read in no other way your peremptory refusal to discuss the ordinances. The Congress is at one with the government in condemning assassinations and should heartily cooperate with the Government in exterminating such crimes.

LIBERAL LEADER'S TRIBUTE
OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 30.—(By The Canadian Press)—Rt. Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King, leader of the Liberal party and former prime minister of Canada, tonight paid the following tribute to Sir George E. Foster:
"Public life has lost, in the passing of Sir George Foster, the oldest member of the Privy Council of Canada. Alike in years and length of service, Sir George was also the oldest member in our Parliament. He held office in the Conservative Administrations which preceded the government formed by Sir Wilfred Laurier in 1896. Even at that time he had been a minister of the Crown for more than ten years. He was active in the political life of our country.
There were years when Sir George experienced, as few others, all that was bitterest in political controversy. That day is now so long ago that it is forgotten by most of the present generation, and it is altogether unknown to not a few who have followed Sir George's great career in recent years. Most of those who shared with him the public burdens of the critical period of the war and reconstruction, or who were in parliament with him since, came to have a regard for his qualities, which, as his years advanced, might be said to have approached veneration.
"I think I may, today speak for the Liberal party as a whole when I say that, in the passing of Sir George Foster, the citizens of our country, irrespective of political affiliations, mourn the loss of a great Canadian statesman whose

WARM TRIBUTES TO THE LATE SIR GEO. FOSTER

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 30.—(By The Canadian Press)—Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett tonight paid tribute to Sir George E. Foster, in expressing his deep regret at the death of Sir George, the Prime Minister stated:
"Rt. Hon. Sir George E. Foster was the sole surviving colleague of Sir John MacDonald. He was the senior member of the King's Privy Council for Canada, having been appointed Minister of Marine and Fisheries on the 10th December 1925. He had a long distinguished and strenuous public career. Possessed of great intellectual endowments which were developed in the universities of Canada, Great Britain and Germany, he early gave evidence of those powers of concise and logical statement, and clear exposition for which he was so long distinguished. A skilled debater, he became pre-eminent as a parliamentarian. Those who recall his speeches will remember his calm, impassioned and convincing logic expressed in language at once simple and classic.
"He was a firm believer in the British Empire; was convinced of the value of imperial preferences, and was responsible for the negotiation of many trade agreements. Our system of trade commissioners was established under his direction. He has left behind him enduring memorials in statutes which are now part of the law of the country. He visited practically every part of the world and his public addresses created added interest in Canada.
"He earnestly believed in the League of Nations, which he was convinced was an organization for effectually promoting the maintenance and preservation of world peace. He was a great public servant. He successfully withstood political attacks of more than ordinary bitterness without resentment and by untiring perseverance crowned a career of great usefulness, was honored by his sovereign, and respected and esteemed by Canadians in every walk of life, regardless of their political affiliations.
"The public life of Canada will be poorer for his passing."

SIR GEORGE PERLEY
Sir George Perley, senior Privy Councillor in the administration of Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett and former colleague of Sir George Foster in the Borden Government tonight paid the following tribute:
"The senior member of the King's Privy Council for Canada has left us—full of years and honor. Although I was not in public life until years afterwards, I well remember when our friend, Sir George Foster, first came to Ottawa. Even as a young man he had shown himself a fine speaker, and our great chief, Sir John MacDonald, having discovered his ability, brought him into the Conservative Cabinet as Minister of Finance before he was forty years of age.
"From that day to this his life has been one of public service in many and varied capacities. Everyone remembers to his credit his ten years as Finance Minister, and afterwards, in opposition, he was a thorn in the side of the Government.
"When Sir Robert Borden formed his government in 1911, Sir George Foster again took a portfolio, so that he and I were colleagues for years. We all admired his enthusiasm for all the causes that he favored and he was a tower of strength when speaking on behalf of the Conservative policies. In fact he was known through the length and breadth of Canada as one of the most effective of speakers both in the House and on the platform.
"Sir George was the last of Sir John MacDonald's great company and his passing leaves a large gap for all of us who knew him. Our sincere sympathy goes out in full measure to his sorrowing wife in her heavy bereavement."

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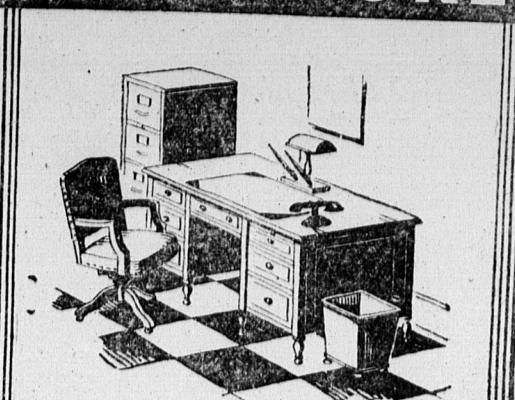
