TO DESTROY SUBMARINES A TRAIN

A New Device Now Being Experimented With Pronounced a Success.

LONDON, July 5.—The torpedo-destroyer Vernon has been experimenting for a few days at Portsmouth with secret admiralty devices for destroying submarine boats. The Engineer gives general particulars of the device, which it affirms is one of the most important inventions of the age. The submarine boat, according to present conditions, before attacking a ship must come to the surface and take bearings or else betray its presence with an optic tube or a periscope. With the new invention the sighting of a submarine boat entails on her

downward and aft and it is exploded directly the submarine boat is passed. The speed of the destroyer carries her past the centre of explosion before its full effects reach her, though in any case the destroyers are too light to be seriously affected. With the submarine boat it is different, as it experiences the full force of the concussion within 60 or 100 feet or more of the centre of the explosion. According to the charge employed, the sides of the submarine boat should be compressed sufficiently to cause fatal leaks, while even at a greater distance stability should be destroyed.

ALMOST CERTAIN DESTRUCTION. The sighting is now partially certain. It is not to the public benefit, however, that the means employed should be stated, for the principle has other and varied uses. But in general terms, it may be stated that it is proposed that each destroyer shall be fitted with a crutch upon which a boom 42 feet long works. This boom normally stows inboard and forward. At the far end a charge of explosives is carried, which can be exploded like all spar torpedoes. On going into action the boom is swung out well forward and immersed. AT THE PROPER MOMENT. The immersion carries the boom end

EXPERIMENT AT PORTSMOUTH was not enough to indicate exactly the best position for the boom, and the first boats fitted out with the new device probably will vary somewhat between, having it on the quarter or the right aft. The additional weight of the boom will be slight, and in the case of the destroyer which has been experimentally fitted the weight has been more than compensated by fitting her with aluminum instead of the usual torpedo tubes. This particular device is merely one of the several equally simple remedies against submarine torpedo boats.

STUDENTS' CONFERENCE

The Guardian Correspondent's Second Letter. The Heat Restricts Many.

NORTHFIELD, Mass. July 3rd.—As the Conference proceeds it gains in power and interest. The speaker so far who has attracted the most interest has been Mr. Campbell Morgan.

France spoke. Was it any wonder that at the stage the audience joined with great spirit in singing "All hail the power of Jesus name."

Owing to the terrific heat the delegation this year is perhaps not as large as usual. Ten universities and colleges of Canada have delegations present. Perhaps the most interesting and impressive single feature of the whole Conference so far was the evening given up to address of about five minutes each, from fifteen different countries. All were inspired as we listened to those foreign delegates tell of the struggles and successes of the gospel in their several countries. Every student present was deeply moved when the delegate from Russia, who spoke through an interpreter told of the awful spiritual darkness of the students of that great land. He made a feeling reference to the recent student's riots and regretted their occurrence. After Russia, representatives from Switzerland, Germany, Holland, Belgium and Hungary,

When all had spoken the president Mr. Mott asked for each nation in its own language to bear witness for Christ. A student from Dublin university, Ireland began by repeating the verse of scripture "I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ for it is the power of God unto Salvation to every one that believeth." It was something long to be remembered to hear men in fifteen different languages bearing the testimony to the saving power of Christ and as the leader gave out the hymn "Blest be the tie that binds" there was not a soul in all that Conference that did not join with all their hearts.

DESERTS U. T. TRAINING SHIP. There have been about fifty successful desertions from the receiving ship Vermont, in the Brooklyn Navy Yard, during the past month, besides many unsuccessful attempts. The sailors say that Capt. Snow is too strict, that they do not get good food, and that many privileges hitherto allowed have been taken away from them.

A DESPERATE LEASE. Tillman Newhart, a 16 year-old boy, ran away from his home in Pittston, Pa., several months ago, because his parents objected to his attentions to a young girl. He sought the mines at Avondale to earn money in order to marry. Wednesday evening Newhart saw the girl walking with a rival and became jealous. The rival some days ago, because he was rejected, broke into the girls home and cut her clothing into shreds. On Thursday Newhart committed suicide by drinking carbolic acid.

AMERICANS DEFEATED

WRECKED By the Boers With Loss of Life

TRANSPORT FLOATED Boers and Supplies Captured

—Russel to be Tried For Bigamy.

BOERS WRECK A TRAIN. LONDON, July 5.—(Special).—Lord Kitchener cables from Pretoria that a train from Rittersburg was wrecked by the Boers north of Neoboomspruit. A Lieutenant and nine men of the Gordon Highlanders were killed besides artilleryman, engine driver, fireman, guard and four natives.

PENNSYLVANIA UNIVERSITY CLUB DEWMA. HENLEY, July 5.—(Special).—To the disappointment of all Americans at the Henley Leamur Rowing Club crew, this morning defeated the Pennsylvania University crew in the final heat for the grand challenge cup.

THE MONTFORD HAS BEEN FLOATED. British transport Montford with 1,000 troops from Cape ashore on Isle of Wight floated and proceeded to Southampton.

WILD CHEERING AT CONCLUSION. Never before was their such cheering heard at Henley as greeted the contestants down the course. Pennsylvanians made a noble effort but they were beaten by the length time seven minutes, 44.5 seconds.

94 BOERS WITH GUNS CAPTURED. Lord Kitchener telegraphs Grenfell on July 1st that Howell captured 94 Boers and a lot of supplies belonging to Beger's commando.
