A committee with Dr. George Pidgeon of Toronto, as chairman has been studying the proposed Canada wide campaign, which will have as its object "the revitalizing of the spiritual life of the churches and the Christianizing of the social life of the Dominion". The movement is inter-denominational. Rev. Mr. McLeod said. A team of outstanding speakers will be sent to Prince Edward Island and will begin work in Charlottetown and continue through out the Province for about six weeks if present plans mature, it was announced.
