REUNION OF N. AND S. VETERANS

The recent Peace reunion and encampment of the veterans of the North and South on the field of Gettysburg from a Newspaper and Telegraph standpoint was one of the most picturesque and important events in history.

Every newspaper of any importance in the United States, and several of the large Canadian publications sent trained photographers and correspondents to report the camp for their papers, and it was necessary that they be provided with facilities for quick, complete and practically continuous service.

The newspaper men, and the Western Union Telegraph Company's representatives had several large tents fitted up as offices and from these tents, on the actual field of battle, the news item by item was flashed to the outside world of what was taking place from time to time.

A nineteen conductor cable was strung a mile and a half to the nearest main line, and two copper circuits were leased from the telephone company.

The fastest sending operators from New York, Chicago and Boston were assigned to this work, a night and day force of fifteen men and they handled over one million words, 163,000 words being handled in one day.

At this reunion there were thirty-five State Governors, a host of Cabinet Ministers, Senators, Congressmen and other distinguished guests.

One hundred and forty one newspaper men, one third of whom were photographers, kept the outside world posted, as to what was going on at Camp.

Among the representatives of the world's best known publications was a correspondent of the London Times who filed in one evening over one thousand words of cable press for his paper.

JACK FROST PAID ONTARIO A VISIT.

TORONTO, Aug. 14.—Old Jack Frost got a bit busy in some parts of Ontario early this morning, but did no damage to late fruits or to the crops.

At White River there was a drop of 28 degrees, at Cochrane early today there was a drop to 34 degrees.

There was a big drop between 3 and 4 o'clock this morning in Toronto the thermometer registered 50 degrees. The temperature, however, has risen steadily and at noon registered 65 degrees.

The weather experts state that on Friday and Saturday nights it was quite cool in the west, but that the drop in no wise "touched" the crops. It will be comparatively cool tomorrow throughout Ontario.

ORANGEMEN AND NATIONALISTS FIGHT

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Aug. 14.—The police were again today constantly employed suppressing street fights between Orangemen and Nationalists. Numerous charges were made by the police, who used their clubs freely.

A man named Armstrong was shot dead during the fighting which began a political meeting Tuesday.

Armstrong was looking out of an upper window at his home when he was shot.

His brother says he saw four constables, pursued by a mob, load their carbines and fire, but the police deny this.

The mob was so great and the confusion so great it is difficult to tell what happened.

It is certainly believed, however, that the police fired over the heads of the mob, many of whom were armed with revolvers.

Several persons, already, have been removed to hospital, suffering with wounds; among them a constable.

Magistrates today decided to close all taverns until disorders cease.

Tonight it was decided to requisition troops.

All was quiet at midnight.

A SEQUEL TO NAVAL MANOEUVRES

LONDON, August 13.—The results of the recent naval manoeuvres are being, as usual, kept profoundly secret, but enough is known to create the belief that they are regarded as important.

Already the Admiralty have resolved on an enormous increase of the aerial fleet, and it is said that all captains who took part in the manoeuvres are clamoring for seaplanes, which, it is being rumored, proved singularly effective in detecting movement in the army and of stealthy attacks by destroyers.

Already ten airships are under construction while 100 seaplanes are to be built in addition to as many more now in process of construction.

It is possible that aerial craft will, to a great extent, take the place of light cruisers for scouting, and it is expected that fewer cruisers will be built and consequent economies are to be devoted to the formation of seaplane stations around the coast.

Another result has been to awaken the sense of immunity from invasion. The sea and promptly with which the Red fleet landed troops in the Humber with particularly no interference has created uneasiness.

It is noted that the Blue fleet was perfectly aware of the departure of the enemy from the Thames with transports containing troops, and yet, within two days the troops were landing while the defending fleet was lured elsewhere.

Even though the operation would be more difficult for a large invading army it has proved that raids are quite feasible, which might seriously compromise national safety by the destruction of the wireless stations, oil reservoirs, stores and railways. In addition to our experience, another object lesson has been learned from Brest, where a squadron of submarines entered this most difficult harbor, and came along the coast quite unobserved.

It would seem that naval tactics and weapons are on the eve of a great revolution.

AN UNPLEASANT OUTLOOK.

Very few members of the House of Lords heard the Naval Debate which was opened by Lord Selborne on Monday but its importance is an inverse ratio to the attendance.

MOB AT WORK IN NANAIMO

(Canadian Press) VANCOUVER, July 12.—Nanaimo is under martial law today after a night of terror. Saloons are closed and a large number of special officers have been sent from Vancouver and Victoria.

The home of Alex. McKinnon at Ladysmith was attacked and the building wrecked. A stick of dynamite with a short fuse was thrown through the window and McKinnon, calling on his family to escape, snatched it up and attempted to throw it out of the window, but the dynamite exploded in his hand blowing it off and perhaps fatally injuring him.

The temperance hotel at Ladysmith was blown up with dynamite after the occupants were driven out.

At midnight a mob bombarded the offices of the Herald and were icited to wreck them. No police were available, but the employees armed themselves with chunks of lead.

F. H. Sheperd, M.P., attempted to address the miners to secure 24 hours respite. His reward was a rock which whizzed past his head. Fifteen people were injured, including several policemen.

ESTEEMED TRIBUTE

A tribute to the attractions of P. E. Island and to the efficiency of its militia forces has been paid by Major General Sir Ian Hamilton, Inspector General of the Overseas Forces of the British Empire, who visited this province several weeks ago in the course of his inspection of the entire military force of the Dominion.

This was told to Mr. Donald Nicholson, M. P., when he was in Ottawa last week, in the course of a conversation he had with the Minister of Militia, who accompanied Sir Ian on his tour of inspection.

Colonel Sam Hughes told Mr. Nicholson that Gen. Hamilton had stated that in no part of Canada had he enjoyed his visit so much as his short stay in Prince Edward Island, and in no camp had he seen better work, than was done here.

Sir Ian expressed himself as being more than pleased with the excellent Guard of Honor that was furnished at his departure, and he told Colonel Hughes that he was surprised, but agreeably so, that such a splendid turn-out could have been made at such short notice.

P. R. ASSOCIATION SHOOT PRIZES

Supplementary to List of Prizes Previously Published.

Below are published the full prize-lists of the concluding competitions in the annual rifle prize meeting of the Provincial Rifle Association of P. E. Island, which was brought to an end on Wednesday. These lists were not available for publication before as they were not altogether made up.

From them it will be seen that the H. H. Brown match, consisting of 10 rounds at 800 yards, was won by Sgt. E. McInnis with the excellent score of 49 out of 50; the second prize going to G. P. Thompson who made only one point fewer, as did Major Leigh and Private C. May, who received third and fourth prizes respectively.

The other long range event, the MacKinnon Drug Co. Match—ten rounds at 900 yds.—was won by Mr. P. Barlow with a score of 46 out of 50, by counting out Messrs. W. S. Louison and R. V. Longworth, who both had similar scores, and respectively took second and third prizes. It is worthy of note that they are all three members of the Civilian Rifle Club of Charlottetown, as is Mr. J. A. Stewart, who carried off the fourth prize with a score of 45 pts.

The Ottawa Aggregate, the principal prize in which were the D.R.A. Silver and Bronze Medals, was won by Sgt. E. McInnis, who had also secured the Silver Medal in the Governor General's prizes. For the bronze medal, there was a tie in the aggregate of points, but on the value of the scores at the longer ranges, Lieut. G. E. Ritchie counted out Pte. L. R. Allen, of Summerside. The first twelve men in the Ottawa Aggregate are entitled to selection as the Island's team for the D. R. A.'s prize meeting at Ottawa next week, and to receive in consequence from the Association the grant towards expenses of \$10 each. It may be noted that in the place of any of these twelve who may find it inconvenient to go to Ottawa, the next men on the aggregate list come in. Also it is worthy of mention that Capt. Brennan who is eighth in the Ottawa Aggregate won the Nicholson Tyro Aggregate which entitled him to a free trip to Ottawa at the expense of Lieut.-Col. Brown of that city. In this case, as Brennan can only take advantage of either of these rights, somebody else already gets a chance to go to Ottawa.

In connection with the meeting, it may be mentioned, Mr. Heeschen, who is in charge of the Ordnance Department, offered a handsome pair of field-glasses for presentation to the competitor making the most bullseyes at the meeting. This entails a tremendous amount of clerical work, considering that there were over a hundred competitors at the meeting, and it is thus not possible yet to announce the winner of Mr. Heeschen's generous gift.

Another matter in relation to the meeting that is noteworthy is the fact that Mr. Thomas O'Brien, who used to be caretaker at the Kensington rifle range for many years, placed now filled by his son Jim—is leaving the Island to go to Truro, N. S., and to show their appreciation of his good services in the years that are past, the riflemen at the meeting subscribed generously towards making him a donation.

It now only remains to record a word of praise to the Committee who conducted the meeting. As Secretaries, Treasurer, Major A. A. Bartlett had enough clerical work for four men, but with the able assistance of Capt. F. Gill, he performed the arduous secretarial and financial duties that fell to him in a manner that gave general satisfaction. As Range Officers Major Leigh, Capt. Stanley and Mr. P. Barlow earned the entire gratitude of the competitors by the satisfactory way in which they conducted affairs at the firing points.

11,200 KILLED IN CANTON, CHINA

Pillage is in Progress Everywhere—Fire and Robbery Rampant.

(Canadian press) CANTON, China, Aug. 14.—Twelve hundred were killed in the fighting with the rebels in Canton city yesterday. Pillage is in progress everywhere. Half the soldiers joined the rebels and together they looted the gold and silversmiths' shops.

Local generals are powerless owing to trouble among themselves. An attack on foreign concessions at Shamen is believed by foreign residents to be in contemplation by disorderly elements.

A detachment of Indian troops, stationed here as guard, was reinforced to-day from Hong Kong in preparation for eventualities. The foreign quarter alone serves as a buffer between the two forces. A huge fire broke out to-day destroying thirty barracks. As a result of the accompanying rioting the exodus of the civilian population continues without abatement. Traffic on the Hankow Railway is suspended from Fayuen to North of Canton. A report was received to-day of a rising of brigands and from other parts of the province of Kwang Tung news has reached here that a state of chaos exists. General Lung Chui Kuang with northern troops retired from the vicinity of the city.
