When Light Deserts Are Preferable

When serving complete dinners or main or heavy meals, serve light desserts after them, such as compotes, gelatine desserts, or eliminate salad courses and serve fresh fruit salad for dessert.

Four boiling liquid on and stir until gelatine is dissolved. Add the rest of the liquid, together with the sugar. Stir until sugar dissolves. Pour into cold, wet mold or molds. Chill until set. Serves six.

Fruit Compotes

Compotes of fruit are very delicate when fruit is not in condition or suitable for serving fresh, which of course, is the more preferable because it is more healthful.

Boil 2 cups of water and 1 cup sugar together 2 minutes. Add a small amount of fruit which has been previously washed, pared and sectioned as the individual fruit demands, and simmer in syrup until tender. Drain and repeat until all the fruit is cooked. Pour over all and chill thoroughly. Serve plain or with lemon juice, or with whipped cream.

The following recipes differ only in kinds and amounts of boiling liquid used. Other ingredients are the same as above.

Lemon Jelly—2 1-2 cups boiling water, 1-2 cup lemon juice.

Orange Jelly—2 cups boiling water, 1 cup orange juice, 2 tablespoons lemon juice.

Coffee Jelly—3 cups hot, clear, strong coffee, 5 tablespoons lemon juice, 3-4 cup sugar.

Fruit Jelly—Make lemon or orange jelly and add 1 cup prepared fresh fruit or canned fruit as directed above. Note: Fresh pineapple has a property which does not allow gelatine to set, so never include it in fruit jelly. Use cooked pineapple.

Snow Pudding Make one-half the recipe for lemon, orange or coffee jelly. When chilled and ready, as directed above, whip until frothy. Add 2 stiffly-beaten egg whites and continue beating until stiff enough to hold its shape. Mold and serve with custard sauce.

Compote of Oranges (French recipe) Peel 4 oranges, divide them into sections and remove seeds. Boil together 1 cup sugar, 1-2 cup water. When they have boiled for 5 minutes, pour them on the pieces of orange, which you have put into a china dish or bowl. Cover them and leave them for 2 hours. Drain the pieces of orange and pile them up high in a glass dish. Strain the syrup, boil it fast for 5 minutes more. Let it cool a little and then trickle it over the fruit. When all is quite cold, add piles of whipped cream here and there, and serve.

Gelatine Desserts (Plain gelatine) Two tablespoons granulated gelatine, 1 cup sugar, 1-2 cup cold water, 3 cups boiling liquid (water, fruit juices or coffee). Soak gelatine in cold water for 5 minutes.

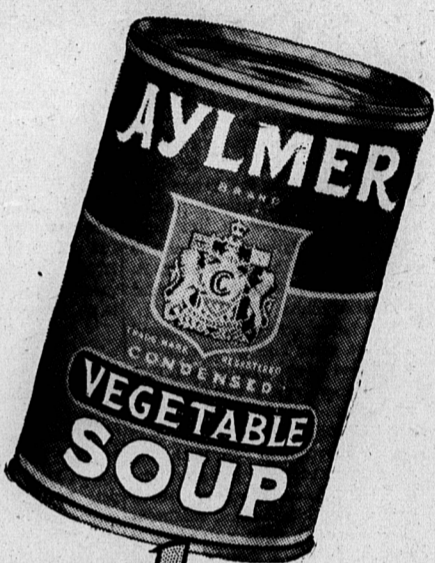

CRACKLY GINGERBREAD

The secret of making dark, crackly gingerbread, shiny on top, is to bear in mind that the shortening must be poured, boiling hot, on the molasses; that the mixture must be beaten as little as possible, and flour mixed in with a few turns of the spoon. Pour one-half cup boiling hot shortening, lard and butter mixed, on half a pint molasses. Add two tablespoons milk and one tablespoon ground ginger. Sift in a generous half pint flour and one teaspoon baking soda, one-half teaspoon salt, and then add one beaten egg. Mix without beating and bake in small dripping pan. Serve hot, and break, not cut, at the table.
