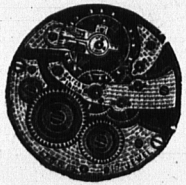

## AUDACIOUS EXCUSE OF THE GERMANS

(Special to The Guardian) LIVERPOOL, Sept. 12.—The White Star Line made the following comment to-day to the Canadian Press in regard to the Government's explanation of the torpedoing of the Arabic: "The German excuse contained in the note published to-day is just as audacious as the previous one. A great point is made of the supposed attempt on the part of the Arabic to ram the submarine, but everyone knows courses must be changed frequently in a channel and that any change of such a kind could not possibly be mistaken by the Germans to mean an attempt to ram. There is not the slightest question that the Arabic did not try to ram for the simple reason that the submarine was not seen by Captain Finch. Moreover the Arabic did not try to escape, the only preparation taken being to put the helm over directly the torpedo was seen."

## ITALY REPORTS PROGRESS

(Special to The Guardian) ROME, Sept. 12.—(Official)—Small successes have been gained by detachments of our troops.

While making reconnaissances at Redi, Castello Zeene and in the valleys of Cameonica, Tirano and Ledro, enemy troops having during the night crept up to the wire entanglements before our positions at Mount Marcina, and the plateau north of Arsiero, they were defeated and driven off by our fire. Other enemy forces tried to set fire to the woods in the Western ridge of Mont Piano but were repulsed. Engagements favorable to us occurred at Passedella (Upper Sexten) and Piano.

## BIG ISSUES
