REV. SIM N. A. FRASER, missionary of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, to Trinidad, addressed a public meeting in the Presbyterian church here Friday evening. Mr. Fraser who is a very interesting speaker has spent five years in contact with heathen, and his address was a graphic account of the religious beliefs and social practices of the people. The development of missions, and the encouraging features of the work. McDonald occupied the seats on the left of the altar. The choir under the direction of Prof. Whitney was assisted by Rev. A. A. McLellan of St. Dunstan's College, and Rev. John J. McDonald of Kirkcubright. The pall bearers were Judge McLeod, Hon. Angus McMillan, Messrs D. H. McDonald, Charles Murphy, P. T. Fanning and R. T. Owen.

BUFFALO IS SCARED.

Fears Diversion of Trade to Canadian Channels. BUFFALO, N. Y., Nov. 2. - The seriousness of the rivalry promised the promoters of the Erie canal by the St. Lawrence route and the danger of divergence of the grain forwarding trade from this city to Port Colborne and Montreal is being realized in Buffalo, and several of the newspapers are publishing the full details on the subject and demanding immediate action for averting, if possible, the destruction of the enormous business done by the large colony of grain elevators at this port. The alarm is general, made so by the published statements of Mr. Tarte upon the policy of the Dominion government in the management of the St. Lawrence route. Local interest is intensified by the knowledge that a Buffalo syndicate, with undoubted power to divert the grain trade to the St. Lawrence route, is negotiating with the Dominion government for a concession which will enable it to make the St. Lawrence route the greatest commercial route on the continent. The superiority of the St. Lawrence route is no longer questioned. It is now beyond doubt that Congress will be besieged this session with demands to take over the Erie canal and make every possible effort to prevent successful competition by the St. Lawrence canal route.

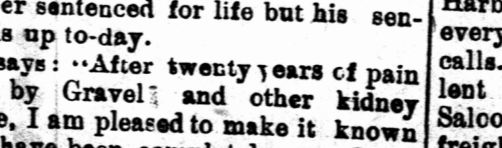
