FATAL FIGHT AT RIVER JOHN

A dispute arose between road foreman George McLeod and Neil Sutherland in which Sutherland was the aggressor. After the first encounter Sutherland fired stones at McLeod and in the fight which ensued McLeod struck Sutherland with a stick rendering him unconscious. Sutherland died soon after.

LATEST NEWS FROM THE WAR ZONE

LAW SOCIETY'S RESOLUTION

LORDS REFUSE HOME RULE

(Canadian Press.) OTTAWA, July 15.—The motion for the second reading of the Home Rule Bill was defeated in the House of Lords this evening by a majority of 238. The vote was 302 to 63. On a motion of Lord Lansdowne leader of the Opposition in the Upper House who declares "that if the House declined to proceed with the consideration of the bill until it has been submitted to the judgment of the people clause two was adopted without division.

BETROTHAL OF PRINCE ARTHUR

(Canadian Press.) LONDON, July 15.—The betrothal is announced of Prince Arthur of Connaught and the Princess Alexandra Victoria, Duchess of Fife. Prince Arthur is a son of the Duke of Connaught.

BAD FIRE IN CHARLOTTETOWN

At a quarter past eleven o'clock last night a fire of somewhat serious extent broke out in Charlottetown, being located in the congested locality of the water front. On the quiet night air, the sounds of the alarm bell rang with startling distinctness, and was immediately followed by the echoes of running footsteps, then by the sounds of the fire-fighting appliances being hurried off to the scene of the conflagration.

EXCHANGE SHIPS FOR ISLANDS

(Canadian Press.) ROME, July 15.—It is reported that Italy has agreed to hand over to Turkey several battleships in exchange for full possession of the Aegean Islands which Italy occupied temporarily during the Libyan war.

SPANISH TROOPS MEET OPPOSITION

(Canadian Press.) TETUAN, July 15.—Fighting has been practically continuous in this territory for the past six days. On Friday 12,000 Spanish troops marched into the surrounding territory where they met a fierce reception from the Moors. After fighting all day and burning huts they returned losing 60 dead and 150 wounded. Hostile tribes are increasing in strength and fighting continues fierce.

SIR IAN HAMILTON COMPLETES TOUR

(Canadian Press.) LONDON, July 15.—The Divorce Court today granted a decree nisi to Mrs. Cornwallis West, who before marriage was Lady Randolph Spencer Churchill. The grounds for the decree were statutory wrong-doing and desertion.
