BY THEIR TEETH

New Method of Identification Better Than Bertillon

At the present time the police departments of Europe and America are seriously considering a system of criminal identification by the teeth, advocated by Dr. Richard Grady. Each cadet, on entering the academy, is examined by Dr. Grady to ascertain the condition of his teeth. Every irregularity is charted, and the peculiarities of each tooth duly noted. The chart is then carefully preserved, and should one of the cadets at any time be killed or mangled so that ordinary body marks might become unrecognizable, identification by means of Dr. Grady's card index is always possible, providing only that most of the teeth remain.

It is contended by Dr. Grady that if such a system were applied to criminals it would prove even more reliable and successful than any other system of identification. It is pointed out that thumbs and fingers may be covered or their lines altered by means of acids; scars can be limited; birth marks may be removed, or so changed as to become unrecognizable, but the man who had a noticeable peculiarity of the teeth—noticeable, that is, to the careful dentist who makes a cast of the individual's mouth, upper and lower jaws, and makes a careful chart therefrom—cannot change the record unless he has every tooth removed, which is a thing few criminals would have the forethought or fortitude to do.

AMAZING MONK

Fanatic Followers' Plight in the Snows of Russia

An Archangel correspondent sends a moving description of the sufferings of Moldavian peasants, who in mid-winter followed the fanatical monk Innocentius more than 1,000 miles from the Podolia Government to the Muromsky Monastery, on the Omega River, where he was banished. Ragged, starving and frost-bitten, death threatened them all on the snowy wastes, when the Archangel authorities sent a force of rural guards to stop their march and arrest their leader, and telegraphed to the Red Cross Society urgently asking for medical aid. Some of the pilgrims had money in comparative plenty, for before starting northwards they had sold their belongings, but it was of no avail in the frozen wilderness. The number was well over 1,000, including a great proportion of women and children. They were sent back to their homes by train in warmed vans. The correspondent witnessed the departure of one party from the station of Nlandoms. Frostbitten cheeks, ears, fingers, and toes were the rule rather than the exception. Nearly all the pilgrims were beggled with dirt. Many women and children were in hysterics. The occupants of one van were squatted on the floor, praying with open Bibles before them. The correspondent questioned the pilgrims as to the hold which Innocentius had over them. Incredible as it may sound in the twentieth century, the following is the gist of the replies he received: The followers of Innocentius thought that Jesus Christ had appeared in the Omega region, and not in Palestine. He was seized there, but was taken elsewhere for crucifixion. "Alpha" and "Omega" in the "Revelation" of St. John designated Our Lord and Innocentius. They had been shown a picture of Innocentius portrayed as Jesus Christ with a nimbus encircling his head and a cross and chalice in his hands. The arrest of Innocentius only served to confirm their belief in his divinity, and they recounted how when the rural guards came to arrest him and one of the guards tried to fire a blank cartridge in order to intimidate him, his rifle had misfired three times. A similar miracle had occurred previously at Balta, in Podolia, when a police officer insulted Innocentius and advanced towards him threateningly. Innocentius looked straight into his eyes and said quietly: "Neither thy hand nor thy foot shall stir," and the policeman stopped dead, as though paralyzed. On being confronted by the rural guards the pilgrims gathered around Innocentius, and had to be dragged away before the monk could be arrested. The Vice-Governor of Archangel approached Innocentius. "Where are you going?" he asked him. "I am going to seek the new Zion," was the answer, and the crowd of pilgrims repeated in song, "We are going to seek the new Zion." When Innocentius was at Balta he attracted thousands of pilgrims to the local monastery by the power with which he was credited of casting out devils.

GIVE SOME DETAILS OF ROYAL TRAGEDY

Countess Marie Recalls the Tragedy of 1889 When Her and Baroness Were Found Dead

Countess Marie Larisch, niece of the late Empress of Austria, made public what purports to be the true story of the mystery surrounding the death of Crown Prince Rudolph of Austria. Since 1889, and wrote bodies of the heir to the throne of Austria-Hungary and Baroness Mary Vetsera were found in the royal hunting lodge at Mayerling, there has been no official explanation of the double tragedy. "The accidental shooting of the Crown Prince when on a hunting expedition," is the way the court circular referred to the tragedy, while there was no inkling whatever that the death of the young Baroness had occurred at the same place or at the same time. The Countess says, in effect, that the Crown Prince killed his sweetheart and then took his own life because he feared that a plot in which he was engaged was about to be discovered, and that he would be court-martialed and shot. That plot, according to the Countess, was a conspiracy on the part of Rudolph, the Archduke John of Tuscany and some others to disrupt the Austro-Hungarian Empire by making Rudolph King of Hungary.

Blames the Baroness

The Countess says that although the Crown Prince was a dissolute man, whose conduct had cost him the love of father, mother and wife, he was not primarily to blame for the affair with the Baroness. The girl fell in love with him before he had ever noticed her, and wrote him a letter begging him to meet her. The Countess appears to have assisted to arrange some of the stolen interviews that followed, though she protests that she only shielded the girl. But soon gossip connected their names. The indiscretion of the young Baroness went the length of publicly insulting the Crown Princess Stephanie, and it seemed probable that she would be dismissed from the court.

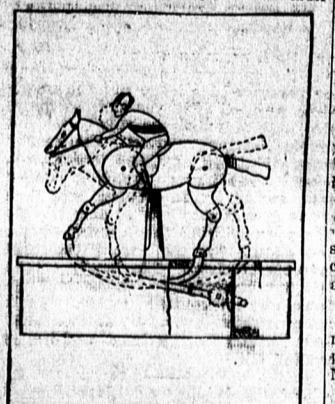
A Ghastly Ride

It was in this crisis of their affairs that Rudolph took her with him on a hunting expedition to Mayerling. One morning when they did not appear at the usual hour, Count Hoyos, the attendant of the Prince, broke open the door and found both dead, a small revolver in the hand of Rudolph. Calling in another servant whom he could trust, the Count removed the body of the girl to another room. Then he had both doors locked and guarded while he hurried to Vienna with the news of the tragedy. It was announced that the Crown Prince had been injured, and after a noted doctor had been hurried to the scene the death was announced. In the meantime, the family of the Baroness Vetsera were communicated with. Two innocents went down to Mayerling to bring the body home. The police insisted that the body should be dressed, and that the body should be held upright between the two uncles on the seat while they drove in a carriage from the hunting lodge. A few miles away, the carriage turned into the gates of a monastery, and here the body was hurriedly buried, neither the father nor mother being allowed to be present and everyone who knew anything of the scandal being sworn to secrecy.

GALLOPING HORSE TOY

Beast's Legs and Head and Jockey's Body Move

An amusing toy in the form of a galloping horse has been designed by a Kentucky man. It is particularly appropriate these days when mechanical toys are absorbing the youth of the land. The body of the horse is fixed to a standard rising from the base, but the forelegs and hindlegs are pivoted to the body and at their

middle joints. The tail and neck are also pivoted to the body and the body of the jockey is pivoted at the hips. The horse's feet are fastened to swinging shafts that operate in the base by means of a rotatable gear. As one shaft is pushed forward the other comes backward, each carrying with it a foreleg and hindleg on the same side of the animal. The gear is operated by means of a crank and the fastidiously turned the faster the horse trots, bobbing his head and waving his tail, while the jockey seems to urge him.

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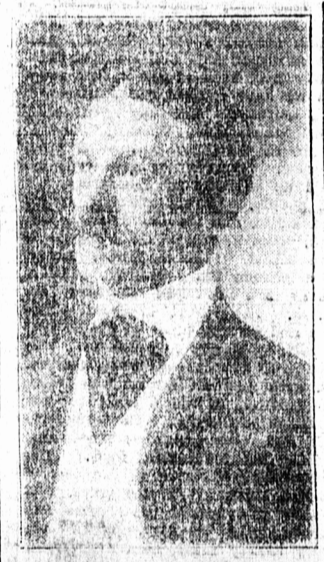

It is surprising the large number of people in Charlottetown who, when they want to inquire about their Morning Daily Guardian or subscription, ask Central for the News phone No. 132.3, instead of 132.2, or when they want to inquire about advertising ask Central for the Subscription phone No. 132-2, or for the News phone No. 132, instead of 132-3; or when they want the News or Editorial Department ask Central for the Subscription phone No. 132-2, or the Advertising phone No. 132-3, instead of 133, although all those departments and their respective phone numbers are plainly given in the telephone book. Some people, instead of looking at the book, even phone one will greatly lessen the work of other departments. All this is a great waste of time on the part of the person phoning, the operator at the Central, and the clerk in the department wrongly phoned. The news staff, on an upper floor, cannot give the necessary information about either advertising or subscriptions, nor the advertising staff about subscriptions or news. In other words the clerks know and can do but their own work in their own departments, and if it were otherwise they could be continually running from one department to another, up and down, mixing work, wearing themselves out and causing the greatest possible confusion. On and after 6 p. m. daily it is useless to ask for any phone numbers except 132 and 133. Patrons who consult their phone books for the numbers they really want number to ask for to get an-
