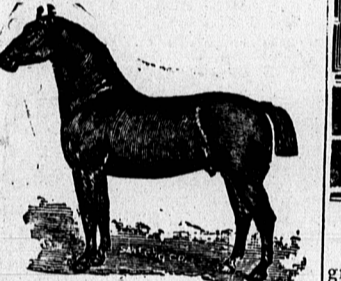

The biggest Dominion Day Meet ever held here will be that on Saturday next.

The fare to St James picnic to Georgetown Wednesday will be 50 cents, children 25 cents.

The men from the "Nobe" will be seen in special events on Saturday at the big Athletic Gathering.

All should remember the Orange tea and celebration on the Exhibition grounds at Charlottetown on July 12th.

Citizens should plan to attend the first big picnic of the season at Georgetown Wednesday next. The ladies of St James are noted for their good teas and the visitors table will be well supplied.

Thirty-one members of the R.C.R., Halifax, arrived in this city Friday evening on the Northumberland. They will go into camp and will attend to the marking and give instruction in range work at Kensington Range.

George J. Rogers fired a salute of 21 guns at noon from the lawn at Fairholm on Coronation Day with the brass cannon, which at one time belonged to the Spaniards, but which was a loyal Britisher Thursday.
