

Beavers Shut Out St. Mary's For First Win In Eight Starts At Halifax

HALIFAX, Jan. 15 — (CP) — Saint John Beavers won their first game in eight starts at Halifax ice this season and boosted their Maritime Senior Hockey League lead to five points by defeating runner-up Halifax St. Mary's 5-0 before a crowd of 5,207. The same two teams meet at Saint John tomorrow night.

It was the third straight loss for the slumping Halifaxians, leaders until only a few days ago, and the first time they had been blanked since the season. Floyd Perras of Beavers earned his fourth shutout of the season and his second of the week to tie Jack Donlevy of Halifax for the most goals.

Saint John Wray, Beavers second-string centre, and Al Legere, third-line pivot, stole the scoring spotlight as Beavers extended their best winning streak to five games. Wray fired three goals, two of them in the third period, and Legere potted the other two. Vic Jackson and Maurice (Mouse) Downing, Wray's linemates, each had two assists.

Beavers, whose best effort in seven previous games here was a 4-1 draw, outplayed and outskated St. Mary's from the opening buzzer in the rugged, fast tilt. Halifax had three of the five penalties called. Notorious post-shooters, Saint John rapped home two second-period tallies and cashed in on the breaks to finish with a three-goal blast in the third period. Halifax still holds an 8-63 season edge over them.

Perras stopped 23 shots to Donlevy's 25, but only a few more in the difficult class.

Hawks' gain on the Halifaxians was scored with the help of Saint John Beavers, who blanked St. Mary's 5-0 at Halifax.

Moncton's power line of Rod McKenzie, Lou Milani and Joe Fitzpatrick again paced the attack, accounting for four goals and amassing seven scoring points. McKenzie sniped a pair of tallies and drew an assist while Milani and Fitzpatrick had a goal apiece. Milani also collected an assist to widen his margin as the league's leading pointmaker.

Brimsek Has 40 Saves As Chicago Scores 5-1 Win Over Boston Bruins

BOSTON, Jan. 15 — (CP) — Inspired by Frankie Brimsek's spectacular goal-tending, Chicago Black Hawks gained their first victory in their last six National Hockey League starts by overpowering Boston Bruins 5-1 tonight before a 12,042 crowd at the Boston Garden. Brimsek, former Bruin, totalled 40 saves and was robbed of a shutout by a deflected shot.

Murray Henderson's 45-foot angle drive bounced off Chicago defenceman Ernie Dickens' chest and dropped into Brimsek's net after 38 seconds of play in the second period.

NEW YORK, Jan. 15 — (CP) — Captain Sid Abel's goal midway in the third period gave the first victory in Detroit Wings a 1-0 place tonight over New York Rangers and a sweep of a home-and-home National Hockey League week-end series with the Rangers.

A crowd of 15,440 at Madison Square Garden saw Terry Sawchuk, rookie Detroit goalie making his fifth N. H. L. start since he was recalled from Indianapolis to replace the injured Harry Lumley, chalk up his first shutout in the big leagues.

For the first two periods both teams put on a close-checking but scoreless battle. The game seemed headed for a scoreless tie until the ninth minute of the final session when the Rangers were shorthanded due to a tripping penalty to defenceman Pat Egan.

During a Detroit surge, Abel, standing just inside the crease, took a Lindsay pass and rammed it into the right-hand corner at goalie Chuck Rayner's pads. Goal judge Frank Reichert did not flash the light because he said the puck had not gone in. But referee Jim Primeau ruled that it was a goal, scored by Abel with Lindsay assisting.

After the game Rayner claimed that the puck, off Lindsay's stick, hit Abel, but that the latter never got his stick on it and that it didn't go in.
