United States Pair Favored To Cop Three Tennis Titles

 OTTAWA, July 23 (CP)—Favored to make a family affair of three titles at the Canadian tennis championships being played here this week are Mr. and Mrs. Morey Lewis, American net stars playing out of Huntsville, Alabama.

Morey, Canadian champion in 1938, is seeded first in the men's singles, while the former Babe Madden of Boston, holds the same rating in women's singles. They also are top-seeded combination in the mixed doubles, which blossomed during the United States national doubles championships at Boston in 1939 led to the title two years later and to a string of titles at state championships south of the border.

Morey, now 28, stocky native of Texarkana, Arkansas, turned to tennis after winning the Texas junior golf championship at the age of 15.
