fullest extent, the trip back, and was
pleased to contribute to The Guar-
dian the account of her sojourn
abroad. She believes that it will take
some time yet for these countries to
recover from the effects of the Great

In Memoriam

MALCOLM SMITH

There passed to eternal reward on
April 10th at the ripe age of 81 years
Mr. Malcolm Smith a life long resi-
dent of Newton, P. E. I. Mr. Smith
was one of the youngest sons of the
late Finlay Smith, a native of Scot-
land who came to the Island as a boy
with his parents. They settled on
a farm at Newton and became one of
the best known families in the district
of Belfast.

Malcolm Smith remained a bache-
lor all his life and for the closing
thirty-five years of that life lived
alone. He was a man of good educa-
tion and devoted much time, particu-
larly in the closing years of his life
to the study of the Bible. No church
service was accounted by him as
worthy of the name without the
singing of the Psalms of David and
the paraphrases.

Mr. Smith was an enthusiastic
Sunday School teacher and taught
in the Newton School for upwards of
sixty years. As a singing instructor
he was well known throughout the
whole community. His presence will
be greatly missed but we feel sure
that our loss will be his gain.

He was for many years an hono-
rary member of Loyal Orange Lodge
No. 2178.

His funeral service was conducted
at the house by the Rev. Thos. A.
Rodger of St. John's Presbyterian
Church, Belfast and at the grave by
his brethren of the orange associa-
tion. The attendance of both Lodge
members and fellow-citizens was one
of the largest seen in this district
for many years.

He leaves to mourn his loss one
sister, Mrs. John McClinton of Char-
lottetown and a twin brother, J.
Pingal Smith of Cranbrook, B. C.
