The Intercolonial Coal-Mining Co., Ltd., have again secured the contract for coal for the P. E. Island railway for this year.—Moncton Transcript.

The funeral of the late Margaret C. McDonnell will take place from her residence, Upper Queen Street by rail to Sherwood Cemetery on Saturday at 2:15 sharp.

The Rev. G. R. White, of Hantsport, will preach his farewell sermon in the Baptist Church next Sunday evening. He will leave next week for his new pastorate at Charlottetown, P. E. I.—Halifax Chronicle.

The session of the Exchequer Court closed yesterday afternoon and this morning His Lordship Mr. Justice, Burbridge leaves for St. John where he will conduct court on Monday. Judgment in the Warburton and other cases has been reserved.

The Princess last night made the earliest arrival yet since the new time table on the I. C. R. went into effect. She reached the Steam Navigation Wharf at 8:10 p. m., having left Pictou at 4:15. The side and wind were apposing on the trip across.

J. W. McConnell. The Summerside members will come to the city by the express Saturday night and return Monday morning.

The public should bear in mind the Maritime Day Services in connection with the Y. M. C. A. next Sunday. H. B. Thompson of Truro, N. S. will be in the city and will address a men's meeting in the Y. M. C. A. at 4 p. m. and a mass meeting for men and women in the First Methodist Church at the close of the evening services. A silver collection in aid of the Maritime Y. M. C. A. will be taken.

DR. Trotter is making headway in his efforts to raise \$100,000 for Alford University and thus meet the conditions of a like contribution from Mr. Rockefeller. Two men in New Brunswick have given \$5,000 each. One of these sums was offered at the last meeting of the university board, and the other has been offered by letter. Dr. Trotter visited Halifax the other day and the Smith family in that city gave a pledge for \$8,000. So says the Halifax correspondent of the Messenger and Visitor.

Hon. H. G. CARROLL, Solicitor General of Canada and M. P. for Kamouraska (Que.) passed through the city yesterday afternoon on the C. P. R. train on his way from P. E. Island to Ottawa. Mr. Carroll told a Telegraph reporter that he had been on the Island, attending a session of the Exchequer Court presided over by Mr. Justice Burbridge. Several cases were before his honor for trial, the most important being that of Judge Warburton against the crown for \$19,000 claimed for property expropriated for the Murray Harbor branch of the P. E. Island Railway. The government had offered \$2,800 for the property but Judge Warburton claimed \$19,000. Judge Burbridge will likely be in St. John in a few days to hold court here.—St. John Telegraph.

The annual convention of the National Council of Women, which opened in Victoria University, Toronto, on Wednesday May 20th and ends May 27th, promises to be one of uncommon interest. The last time the convention met in Toronto was in 1885. Since then it has met in Montreal, Halifax, Ottawa, Victoria, London, Hamilton and St. John. To these annual meetings have gathered representative women from all parts of Canada. This has led to the breaking down of provincialism, and the cultivation of a purely national spirit among the mothers of the country. At this convention the meetings, with a few exceptions, will be open to the public. The sessions will begin at 10 a. m., 2:30 p. m. and 8 p. m. each day, and the program promises to be most interesting. Among the subjects to be discussed are "The promotion of the industrial and fine arts," "The immigration of women to Canada," "The problem of domestic service," "Laws for the better protection of women and children," "Care of the aged and infirm poor," "The establishment of homes for feeble-minded women" and "Domestic science." On the evening of the 20th an at home was given at Victoria College in honor of the guests. Lord Minto presided at one of the evening meetings. Hon. Geo. W. Ross at another and the Mayor at another. The Victorian Order of Nurses will hold an at home on the last evening of the convention.
