Maritime Pure Food Show Opened

HALIFAX, Oct. 14.—Transformed from a theatre of war to the pursuit of peace, the Halifax Armouries presented an animated scene of industrial progress when the Maritime Pure Food show was opened yesterday afternoon by His Worship Mayor Parker.

Fair weather, attractively displayed exhibits and a good attendance, considering the many counter-attractions of the day, marked the opening of the Fair. While primarily to exhibit foods and the merchandise of a retail grocer, there is also a manufacturers' exhibit and a automobile show.

The Pure Food Fair is under the auspices of the Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island Branch of the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada, an exceedingly well organized body, strictly from west of Canada.

President Banfield Pleased. Mr. J. A. Banfield, of the Dominion Board of the Retail Merchants, said that it gave him much pleasure to see such a large number of exhibits from all over Canada.

The whole Fair is arranged under a most artistic and uniform design. It occupies the entire main floor of the Armouries. The booths, all constructed alike, are decorated in the exhibitor's own taste, giving an individuality of detail, but a uniformity of scheme as a whole.

The electric lighting was done by Murray and Stevens, a recently established electrical supply house. It was very effective. The chief feature of the lighting design was the use of large white globes over every booth, very simple, but very effective.

Both the R. C. R. and St. Patrick's Bands were present in the afternoon and rendered excellent programmes. At the farther end of the exhibition hall a vaudeville show with very excellent and entertaining acts is continually in performance during afternoon and evenings.

Mayor Parker, in the course of his opening remarks, said that such Fairs were the things which helped to put Halifax on the map, stimulating trade and were of much benefit to the city generally. He congratulated the men behind the undertaking, and appealed to the citizens to show appreciation for the show being held in the city. It was bringing people not only from all over the Province, but from many parts of Canada.

Patronize local merchants, keep trade within your own town and city, was Mr. Banfield's appeal.

The third annual convention of the Retail Merchants' Association for Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island will open today in the Church of England Institute. There are prospects of a large number of delegates, and a programme of very great interest.
