THE CANADIAN WHEAT POOL

OTTAWA, April 8.—The Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas, M. P., has telegraphed to the President of the Canadian Wheat Pool pointing out that his reply to a supplementary question in the British House of Commons on the 1st April was in no way based upon any feeling prevailing in Great Britain that the pool had been attempting to withhold wheat from the market last autumn.

Mr. Thomas has already accepted the assurances given him by the Wheat Pool in Winnipeg last September that the Pool had been anxious to sell at prices substantially lower than those prevailing at the time.

He is fully aware of the friendly attitude of the Canadian Wheat Pool towards the principles and motives underlying his plan for encouraging a more regular interchange of commodities between Canada and Great Britain, appreciates the difficulties with which the Pool has been confronted, and earnestly hopes that the situation may soon rectify itself to the mutual advantage of Canada and Great Britain.

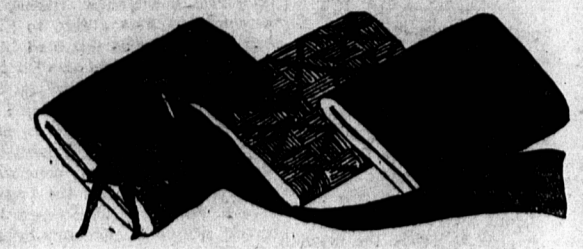
