**THE GEORGETOWN TELEPHONE.**

The great importance of having a telephone at Georgetown railway station during the winter when that town becomes for months the sole open port of the Province, is sufficiently apparent. The ordinary telephone office is located up town at a long distance from the railway station and wharf. Passengers coming and going want to send messages, and do not have time between the arrival of the boat and the departure of the train to go up town to the telephone there.

For the freight business a telephone at the station is still more urgently needed. Shippers in this city and all over the Island have occasion to inquire about the arrival and shipment of goods, and such

inquiries can only be properly and conveniently attended to in an office at the railway station. Without such a convenience there must be a constant messenger service maintained between the up-town telephone office and the railway station and wharf, involving most annoying delays and cost, and rendering direct conversation between the shipper and persons at the wharf impossible.

Last winter pending the receipt and distribution of Government hay, the Provincial Government had a telephone put in at the railway station for their own convenience in regard to the hay business, but which was also of great convenience and advantage to shippers and others. For this we understand the Government paid at the rate of \$15 per

annum. When the hay business was over the Government no longer needed the telephone, but Contractor Kitchen for his private business assumed the charge so long as his business required the service.

Now Mr. Kitchen no longer needs the telephone there, and we are informed that Superintendent Sharp on being applied to declines to pay for a continuance of the telephone service at the station. So the telephone was removed from Georgetown railway station on Saturday. It is most regrettable that for the sake of a paltry \$15 the shipping and travelling public should be deprived of a service worth many times that amount. Surely some plan can be devised by which this service, so urgently necessary, can be continued during the coming winter season, instead of being put off just at the time when the need is greatest.

No doubt, as The Examiner suggests, it would be a good thing in many ways, if some thorough-going English and Scotch farmers could be induced to settle in our Province on the farms that are being from time to time offered for sale. They would realise good value for their investment, would make excellent citizens, and their example of careful, methodical cultivation would be of benefit to our native farmers.

The assault on Madame Bernhardt and her company in Quebec is to be regarded as a very regrettable incident. It matters little that Bernhardt's moral reputation is not so great as her artistic fame. The story has been published all over the civilized world, apparently, and has called forth no end of unfavorable comment. The Canadian people as a whole have long enjoyed a deserved reputation for orderly conduct, which this incident has done much to destroy. Mob-violence cannot be too rigidly repressed wherever it shows itself.

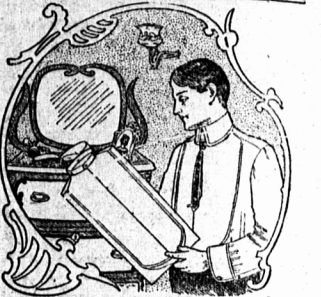
