Caste System Of Old Japan Bars Way Of Romance

TOYKO Sept. 23.—Japanese pride of caste which caused a poor family to refuse to permit a son to marry a girl of the highest social order has created an unusual romantic situation arousing much sympathy throughout Japan.

General Baron Tanaka is one of the wealthiest and most prominent Japanese. He is the head of the powerful Selyukai party and, at any time, may be the Premier of Japan. Lieutenant Masayuki Kozawa comes from a poor and lowly family, but a family of pride in its class.

Grew Up With Daughter
In his extreme youth he was put out to service and became one of the servants of Baron Tanaka. There the youngest grew up with the beautiful Yaeko, daughter of the Baron.

From the first Baron Tanaka conceived a liking for the boy and soon he was almost like one of the family, becoming a constant playmate of the young daughter. The Baron decided to give the youth an education so put him through school and later through his great influence in the Army, obtained his entrance to the Military Academy. In the meantime, it was apparent to all that Yaeko and Kozawa were madly in love with each other.

Baron Tanaka did not object. He liked the young man and he wanted his daughter to be happy. But there was a matter of family.

Once beyond work the woman is abandoned to exist as well as she can on rejected food in the same way as a dog.

An Arab along these shores when he goes a-courting visits the places on the riverside where the women folk do their laundry work. Without uttering a word he selects the girl whom he considers will best suit his purpose. He continues watching her for several days to see how she labors. Then he follows her to her father's tent, where he enters and declares his passion in flowery language to the girl's father, who begins bargaining and terminates with making a contract.

This contains the price at which the girl is to be handed over, and an advance must be made. The girl then belongs to her suitor. Love-making is then at an end. The girl begins her labors for her new lord, often under the whip. This continues throughout her young life and when she is no longer able to do the hard tasks is cast aside for a new and younger bride, who also treats her as a slave.

Ben Cohn, chief of the District Attorney's detective force, is busy broadcasting pictures and descriptions of Ormiston to all United States and Canadian peace officers. It is generally believed, however, that Ormiston is within a short distance of Los Angeles. In the Southern California sector an especially intensive dragnet is being spread.

Augmented by more thousands of late comers they milled about the temple and adjacent streets. Special details of police were hurried to the vicinity. Traffic on the Glendale highway, which adjoins the temple, moved slowly and with much difficulty.

In addition to affecting Chicago stations, the association has stated that its movement is nation wide and that listeners all over the country are joining in the effort to keep the air free of congestion. The B. L. A. also is taking upon itself the task of warning stations which stray about on the air, advising them that their listeners will decrease in number as a result. Response to the strike has been large, the association officials said today, adding that the drive will be continued until more stable conditions prevail, or until congress enacts a law governing the situation.
