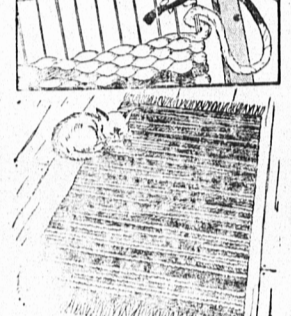

Early Canadian Rag Rug Easy for You to Weave



It is Bright Cotton Strips
Weaving this early Canadian rug with color in variegated effect will give you a rug in a cool and comfortable combination of blue, rust and ivory.

How to do it. Tear out the strips (cut-off dresses, perhaps) into strips 2 1/2 inches wide. Press down 1/2 inch on each side and fold again through the middle. Prepare also some "filler" 1-inch strips of rug which you'll use to start weaving and will later remove.

Now in a home-made wooden frame 28 to 40 inches, drive in nails about 1/4-inch apart on short sides. To set up your warp, start candle-wick yarn, tie one end to your frame and carry up and down over alternate nails.

Next weave 2 1/2 inches of "filler," going over and under warp threads, and weave 7 rows of rust candle-wick for a heading.

Start weaving the body of the rug with a 2 1/2-inch blue strip, then add a strip of another color and length—continuing in this way for variegated effect.

THE COOK'S CORNER

RHUBARB STRAWBERRY JELLY

4 cups fruit juice
7 cups sugar
1 bottle pectin
Method: Wipe the rhubarb, about 1 1/2 lbs., and cut in small pieces. Barely cover with water and simmer until the juice is extracted, then strain through a jelly bag. Wash and hull the berries and barely cover them with water.

RHUBARB GINGER JAM

10 lbs. rhubarb
10-12 lbs. sugar
2 large oranges
2 large lemons
1 1/2 lb. preserved ginger
Method: Wipe the rhubarb and cut into 1/2-inch pieces. Quarter the oranges and lemons, remove the seeds and cores and slice paper thin. Cut the ginger in thin slices and mix all the fruit.

ORANGE BREAD

1 cake compressed yeast
3-4 cup lukewarm water
7 tablespoons evaporated milk
1 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons sugar
5 cups bread flour
3 tablespoons orange juice
1 egg yolk
1 teaspoon grated orange rind
3 tablespoons butter
Soften the yeast in lukewarm water. Add the evaporated milk, salt and enough flour to make a soft sponge. Beat egg yolk and add orange juice, rind, butter and sugar to sponge. Beat hard, then add rest of flour. Knead dough until it is smooth and elastic and full of air bubbles.
