GREAT BRITAIN WILL BENEFIT

New Australian Tariff Gives Old Country Preference—Regarded by Protectionists as Triumph—Free Traders Call it Sham.

MONTREAL, Q., Aug. 14.—A special cable from Sydney, Australia, says: The new budget expounded by Sir W. Lyne is regarded by protectionists as a triumph for the preference, but free traders call it a sham preference. At present a close analysis of the tariff is impossible, but there is approximately an average of five per cent. in favor of Britain.

Premier Deakin was absent from the house through illness. Mr. Cook, the opposition leader, analyzed the preference lengthily. He said: "It is tariff set up against Britain as well as the former. There is no trace in this highly prohibitory tariff of that sacrifice which Mr. Chamberlain said was the basis of the Empire."

The tariff raises the duty on all the principal Australian manufactures and embraces an elaborate scheme of duties on iron subject to the passages of the

iron bonus bill. Great Britain receives a preference on 250 items. There is no preference on larger agricultural machinery, but on hundreds of machine parts Great Britain receives special consideration. The new duties are estimated to produce £300,000 annually.

Bills extending protection to the consumers are promised later. The Melbourne Age (Protection) says many doubt the wisdom of the preference seeing that the English government unequivocally even contemptuously rejected the principle at the imperial conference. "It is doubtful whether it is consistent with our dignity or prudence to offer a gift which the recipient takes with levity," says the Age.

Another estimate of the British preference makes it average 11 1/2 per cent. with an actual value of £1,200,000.

The Koran. The Koran, or Al Koran, the sacred book of the Mohammedans, was written about 610 A. D. by Mohammed. There are today some 200,000,000 of human beings who profess to believe in the Koran.

The Ship's Log. The ship's log consists of a log chip and a log line. The log chip is a piece of board, shaped like the fourth part of a circle, loaded with lead on the round side, so that it will stand up in the water. The log line is 150 to 200 fathoms long. It is wound upon a large reel, so held as to let it run out easily. The line is divided into equal parts by bits of string run through it, each marked by the number of knots in it; hence these divisions are called knots. The log chip when thrown into the water stands still and draws out the log line as fast as it unwinds, and the speed of the ship is shown by the number of knots that run out in half a minute. The usual length of a knot is 47.3 feet. When it is known how many of these run out in half a minute, it is easy to calculate how many would run out in an hour by multiplying by 120. The record of the heaving of the log, as well as all important things happening on shipboard, is made in a log book—Cincinnati Enquirer.

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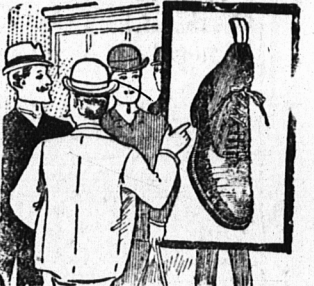
