BELL GOVERNMENT WAS SWEEPED OUT OF EXISTENCE IN YESTERDAY'S ELECTION

The Premier and all His Ministers Defeated. Only Four of the Rank and File Survive. Large Majorities for Successful Conservative Candidates.

The result of yesterday's election is more sweeping than had been anticipated by the most ardent Conservatives. The opposition has been returned by a majority of twenty-five to four only one Liberal surviving in Kings and Queens Counties, namely, Mr. Irving in Belfast.

In Prince County Messrs Blanchard, Dennis, Saunders and MacArthur survived. The Conservative majority in practically all cases were unusually large. Of the 100 members of the House of Assembly, 75 were returned by a majority of almost two to one, the victory proving exceedingly popular as was evidenced by the enthusiastic meeting in Market Hall. 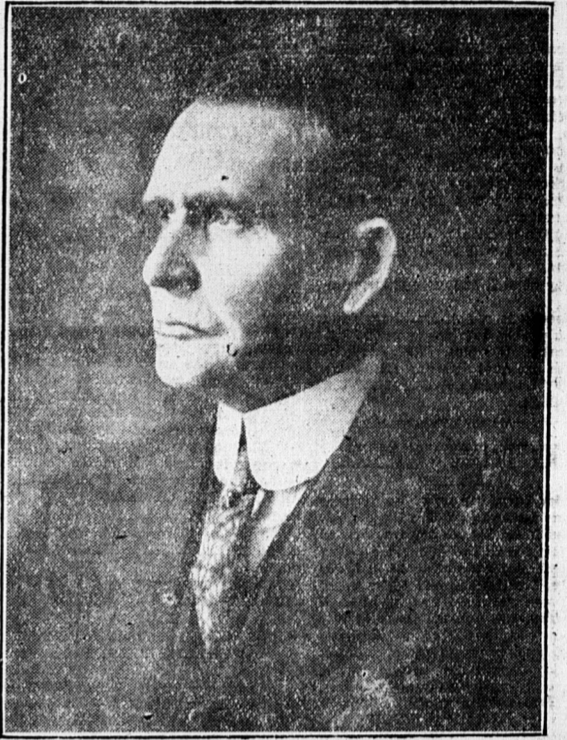

Manitoba Telephone Company Will Pay War Bonus

WINNIPEG, Man., July 26.—Claims against the Manitoba Government Telephone system for a war bonus promised employees of the service when they enlisted have been amicably settled. Under the settlement \$78,527.19 will be paid bringing the grand total paid for war service bonuses to \$262,687.04. The men have agreed to accept not less than 50 percent of the total claims in provincial bonds, on the condition that claims below \$500 are paid in cash. Several of the claims were considerably reduced for \$3,000.
