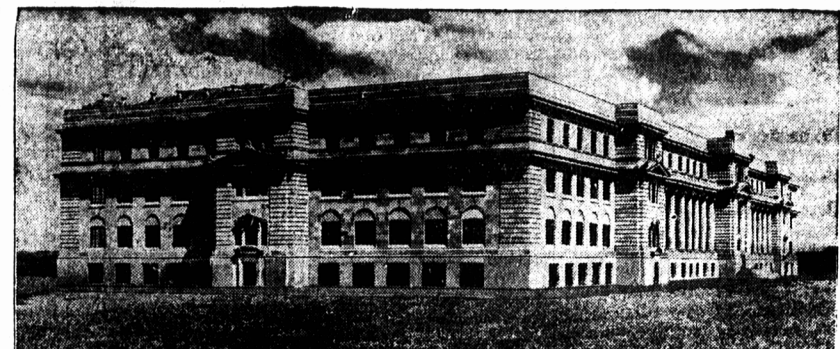
Two Die From Drinking Alcohol

MINERS LOSE LIVES IN EXPLOSION

Six Bodies Located And No Hope For Safety Of Other Four.

NORTON, Va., June 13.—(A.P.)—Rescue squads tonight offered no hope for recovery alive of any of 10 men caught in the morning by an explosion in the mine at the Splashdam Coal Corporation operating 40 miles from here. C. B. Neal, Secretary of the Virginia Coal Operators' Association who accompanied the first rescue squad, reported tonight that three bodies had been found and identified, three others were located and soon would be brought out and that it was hoped to reach the remaining bodies by some time tonight.

"Peace Dove" Pays Visit To Hall Of Fame

OTTAWA, June 13.—(By The Canadian Press)—A carrier pigeon from Montreal alighted this afternoon at the main entrance to the Parliament Buildings, went in the open door, and casually waddled down the hall of fame. It may have been a dove of peace for the coming Imperial Conference.

VESSEL CAPT. GETS JUDGMENT

QUEBEC, June 13.—Declaring the seizure of the schooner J. A. T. by officers of the Quebec Liquor Commission Preventative Staff last August to be unwarranted and unjustified, Mr. Justice Gibson today condemned the commission to pay Capt. E. Truchon, owner of the vessel, \$200 damages with the interest and costs of the action in a judgment handed down in the Superior court.

Churchman Passes Away

TORONTO, June 13.—(By The Canadian Press)—Half a century of service in the Presbyterian and United Church was terminated suddenly with the death today of Rev. Dr. Alfred Gandier, who a few days ago retired as principal of Emmanuel Union Theological College, Toronto. He was 71. At one time he held a pastorate at Halifax.

COMPARES CUBA WITH OLD RUSSIA

Former Sugar Planter And Exile Bares Conditions In Southern Republic.

MONTREAL, June 13.—(By The Canadian Press)—The situation in Cuba today might well be compared with Russia during the time of the revolution, J. Cadenas, formerly a sugar planter in Havana and now an exile owing to a part he played in an abortive attempt at revolution last August, stated in an interview here today.

Mounties Now Total 2,100

OTTAWA, June 13.—(By The Canadian Press)—With a strength of approximately 2,100 officers and men, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police is now at its highest establishment since its foundation in 1873. In the last few months it has received an access of strength of nearly 800 all ranks due to the absorption of the customs preventive service and the provincial police of Alberta, Manitoba, and the three Maritime Provinces. Only British Columbia, Ontario and Quebec continue to maintain separate police forces, and the expectation is that an agreement may shortly be concluded with the Pacific coast province bringing it into line, for police purposes with the rest of Canada east and west of the central provincial boundaries.

Arrest Cubans

HAVANA, Cuba, June 13.—(A.P.)—A raid on a house here today yielded a list of some 60 names of Cubans who the authorities said were implicated in an attempt to assassinate President Gerardo Machado. A score of persons were arrested.

Only One Seat Is Conceded To Liberal Party

Returns Late Last Night Show Gov't. With Only One Seat So Far—United Nfl'd. Party Well In Lead. Premier Squires Is Defeated

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., June 13.—(By The Canadian Press)—Sir Richard A. Squires, a colorful and leading figure in Newfoundland politics since he became Prime Minister in 1919, and the centre of a riotous outburst by the citizenry which resulted in the dissolution of Parliament last April, suffered a personal defeat in the general elections held Saturday. In addition he saw to day, in the tardy returns from outlying districts, an ever increasing volume of votes against the Liberal party he headed. Late this afternoon definite returns showed the election of only one Government supporter. The Opposition, United Newfoundland party, led by F. C.

Economy Is The Watchword

LONDON, June 13.—(Canadian Press Cable)—Economy is the watchword in both the House of Lords and the House of Commons. A large meeting of Conservative members of the Lower House tonight decided to appoint an influential committee to take up with the Chancellor of the Exchequer the question of further governmental economies.

Is Given Six Months

MARSEILLES, France, June 13.—(A.P.)—Gonzalez MacAnares, who struck former King Alfonso of Spain several times in the face upon Alfonso's arrival here from Malta on May 13, was sentenced to six months imprisonment today.

Superannuation Age Is 70

OTTAWA, June 13.—(By The Canadian Press)—The superannuation age of employees in the Dominion Post Office Department is remaining at seventy years of age and no change is at present contemplated. This was the statement of the post office authorities this afternoon in regard to a report that employees in the Victoria, B. C., post office over 60 years of age were being notified they would soon be retired. Where there is a case of ill-health or the position disappears, though, retirement may be made before seventy years, it was stated, in accordance with long established practice.
