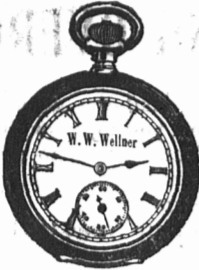

After that the puck was worked up the ice and Moffatt scored. In a few minutes Eddie Curran scored the second goal. At 25 minutes' time Twaddle scored from the centre of the ice. During the last 20 minutes the play was in the Ramblers' territory.

In the second half there was no score. North Sydney outplayed the Ramblers for 25 minutes of this half, but could not score. The last five minutes' play was around the North Sydney goal, Morrison making some fine stops. Curry was not called to stop many, but never let the puck pass.
