BRIDE CALLING IN-LAWS HER "LOVE-KIN" PLEASES HUSBAND

Widower's Children, Aunts, Grandmother No Obstacle Where Girl Uses Diplomacy

Among the most esteemed of my friends is a woman who always speaks of the relatives she acquired by marriage as "my love kin." This woman married a widower with several halfgrown children, who were just at the age when youngsters are most resentful of all parental authority and are just spoiling for a fight with a stepmother. Furthermore, there was a whole galaxy of dotting aunts and cousins, to say nothing of Grandmother, on their mother's side, waiting, with their spy glasses in their hands, to see that no strange woman put anything over on their dear darlings' poor, helpless little ones.

I commend this little story to the prayerful consideration of the thousands upon thousands of young girls who are rushing into marriage in these hectic times, without giving even a single thought as to how they are going to get along with their husbands' people. They think that is a negligible consideration, and that if their Johns love them and they love their Johns, it is all that matters.

Nothing is more common than to hear a girl say that she isn't marrying her husband's family, but that isn't true. Every wife takes her husband's people along with him, for better or worse, for richer or poorer, in sickness and in health, and she is united to them until death do them part. IRONING TALK

New material designated for an ironer or ironing board cover should be laundered before taking up its new position. CHOCOLATE CRUMB PUDDING

3-4 cups milk.
2 cups soft stale bread crumbs
1-3 cup cocoa
1-3 cup sugar
1-2 teaspoon salt
2 eggs.
1 teaspoon vanilla or
1-2 teaspoon cinnamon.
Scald milk, add bread crumbs and let stand until soft. Combine cocoa, sugar and salt and add to beaten eggs. Add this to the milk and bread mixture and stir well. Add flavouring. Pour into a greased pudding dish. Place in a pan of hot water and bake in a moderate oven, 350 F. until set or steam 1 hour. Six servings.

Pumpkin Custard

1 cup cooked sieved pumpkin.
1-4 cup brown sugar
1-4 teaspoon salt
1-2 teaspoon cinnamon
1-2 teaspoon ginger
1-4 teaspoon nutmeg.
1 egg
1 cup milk.
Mix sugar, salt and spices with pumpkin. Beat egg, add milk and combine the two mixtures. Pour into greased custard cups, set in a pan of hot water and oven-poach in a moderately hot oven, 375 degrees F until set, about 1 hour. Six servings. The mixture may be poured into an unbaked pie shell and makes 1 medium pie.

Price Control Questions And Answers

Questions and Answers on Price Control will appear in this column as a regular feature each day. The questions are those which have reached the Wartime Prices and Trade Board from business and this regular. The answers are provided by the Board members. Persons who have intelligent questions to ask on price control are invited to send them in writing to the Women's Regional Advisory Committee of the War Time Prices and Trade Board.

Q. Is it illegal to donate any rationed articles to my church to use for a church dinner or tea?
A. It is quite legal for members of a church or other organization to pool supplies obtained by their own ration books for use as supper or other such functions. Consumers who are not of the same household may use or consume among them, the rationed foods of any of them, if the use and consumption takes place in the course of a meal or refreshment which they share and have together. However it is contrary to regulations to offer such commodities for sale.

Q. I am a landlord and I have a tenant who is behind in her rent. She is the wife of a man serving overseas. Can she be evicted if he is behind with the rent or omits paying it altogether? Are the wives of men in the forces subject to the same laws as other people?
A. Any tenant who does not pay his rent when it becomes due is subject to proceedings being taken by the landlord to protect his own interests, in exactly the same manner as before rents were controlled. The fact that the husband is in the Forces is not privileged in this respect.

Q. Is cranberry sauce rationed?
A. Yesterday in this column the answer was given as "no" but since then information has been received to the effect that cranberry sauce is ON THE PRESERVES RATIONING LIST. It may be secured through surrender of D coupons.

NEW BACKGROUND HELPS FURNITURE

NEW YORK—A new background will often do wonders for a heterogeneous collection of furniture, bringing the various pieces into harmony. A change of wall paper alone is sometimes sufficient. Problem pieces that have hitherto appeared to dominate the room, will become unobtrusive against a different background. Changing the position of furniture helps too. Play up the pieces of which you are proud, relegating the others to less conspicuous places. Pieces flat against the wall for instance (a primary law of decoration), show off less than those out in the floor; though armchairs, of course, may be placed beside major pieces or the fireplace for a cosy effect.

CURTAINS OF LACE OR NET MENDABLE

Although mending lace and net curtains is frequently necessary, it is a complicated business if you tackle it as you do other mending. Darning is laborious and the effect is usually unattractive. However, there is an easy way to do everything, and this problem is no exception. First, be sure your curtains are clean. Dip them in gentle lukewarm suds, dry, and iron them carefully. Then take a piece of clean net, as near the

right mesh as you can get, dip it in starch, lay it over the whole, and iron over it with a moderately hot iron. This will stick it firmly in position without any bulky edges. In the case of a slit or tear fine net can simply be used as a "backing" to hold the two edges together, and it is not necessary to find a matching piece of lace.

TAILORED SATIN SUIT BY MME. LYOLENE

NEW YORK—For occasions when something floor-length is desired Mme. Lyolene suggests a tailored satin suit, slim of skirt with jacket as tailored as a man's tuxedo—under it a blouse, simply made of lace embroidered in vertical rows of color. There's a strong feeling for Russian lines and colors (this is natural considering Mme. Lyolene is Russian) and some of the pieces are frankly copied from Russian tunics or boleros. With these Mme. Lyolene suggests you wear a long skirt—usually in crepe or chiffon, the jacket or tunic top in wool or velvet. Always one to use up precious stuffs on hand, she has converted antique capes into dashing, youthful evening jackets suggesting to her clients that they go on an stile hunt and utilize any heirloom pieces they may have on hand.

SOAP SCRAPS SALVAGED

Soap scraps can find a job long after they are too small to leave in the soap dish. When a number of scraps have been collected tie them into a piece of soft flannel. The flannel with the soap inside should be dropped into boiling water. When it becomes soft, mold it into a ball. The ball should then be dipped into very cold water and allowed to harden. Remove the cloth and press a new ball of soap, made of scraps that might otherwise be completely wasted.
