### IN MEMORIAM

MRS. SIMON BROWN

The death took place at Hunter River, P.E.I., on June 28th, 1938, of "Globe" Clara Johnston, widow of the late Simon Brown, of Greenvale, P.E.I., in the eighty-eighth year of her age. She was a native of Scotland, where she was born on March 18th, 1851. After her marriage she lived at Greenvale, until the death of her husband in 1923, when she removed to Hunter River, making her home with her daughter, Mrs. Eldon Seaman.

Mrs. Brown was highly esteemed for her many kindly qualities. A devoted wife and mother, she was a kind friend and neighbor, and although for a number of years much afflicted with rheumatism, so that she was practically confined to her home, she was ever bright and cheerful, and interested in the affairs of the community, especially those connected with the church. She was a charter member and a devoted worker in the Ladies Aid Society, and was a member of the W.M.S., and was keenly interested in its activities. In failing health for a number of weeks, she died peacefully at her home on Tuesday, June 28th.

She is survived by three daughters, Eliza, Mrs. Sen. Jewell, Concord, N.H.; Jamie, Mrs. Jos. Culliffe, Cape Traverse; and Elizabeth, Mrs. Seaman, Hunter River; and three sons, James E. Brown, Winchester, Sask.; William G. Brown, and Melville T. Brown, both of St. John's, Nfld. Her husband was preceded by her nephew, E. H. and two sons, Gordon and George, predeceased her. She is also survived by thirty-six grandchildren, twenty great grandchildren, and one great grandchild. The funeral, which was largely attended, was held on Thursday, July 30th, from the home of Eldon Seaman, to the Hunter River cemetery. The services were conducted by Rev. W. A. MacQuarrie, of Hunter River, assisted by Rev. G. O. Thompson of Brookfield, and Rev. W. G. Quigley of New Glasgow. Favorite hymns were sung by the United Church Choir, "The Lord's My Shepherd," "Jesus Lover of My Soul," and "Peace, Perfect Peace," and a fitting tribute was paid to her life and faithful Christian life from the words of the 90th Psalm "Lord, Thou hast been our dwelling-place in all generations." The pall-bearers were her nephews, Messrs. Harry Brown, Ivan Brown, Melville Brown, Thos. Johnston, Everett Johnston and Brenton Dolan.

### Radishes for a Whole Growing Season

The gardener who does not plant at least one row of radishes in the spring is rare indeed. Everybody likes them, and they are grown all year around for the market. That more gardeners do not do the same is a pity, because radishes are far snappier when pulled fresh from the home garden, and they mature almost immediately. Like any other vegetable, they will grow as early as the first Globes of spring.

The most inexperienced person can grow radishes successfully. Being an obliging plant, they really need no care at all, and will take root almost immediately. Like any other vegetable, however, a little care will go a long way in producing a better root. One bit of care is necessary—how to choose the seed. The best is that which you must choose just when you want them when making a selection.

Mildness has been a problem with radishes for along time, and plant experts have solved this problem in the swift growing varieties which are now in the market. The early globe type is noted for its mildness, but several types of summer and winter radishes have developed a surprising similarity in taste to the earliest crops.

The radish can be planted before the frost is well out of the ground, as it is very hardy. A rich soil is the best for them, and you must complete plant food to the soil at rate of 4 pounds or 100 square feet of area. It, along with water, will produce a firm, solid, snappy root. Hot, dry weather sends them to seed, and makes for spongy, pithy roots.

Look over the radish list, selecting the small round-rooted types for early plantings, and the long-rooted and larger types for summer and late plantings. Plant them at ten-day intervals for a continuous supply.

Winter radishes sown in the latter part of June produce huge roots of very mild flavor which can be kept a long time in good condition, and a crop of them will add a welcome dish to the winter menu.

### Things to Remember When Buying Towels

If you must have towels that will hold the towel to the light, pull it between the thumbs and shake it. Next examine the selvage and the hems. These are four simple tests that may be applied when buying.

The weave under the nap is the backbone of the towel, so hold the towel up to a strong light. You should see only tiny pinholes of light. There should be no streaks or gaps of light showing through the looped nap or underweave.

Next, part the nap. Stretch the towel along its lengthwise thread. There should be almost no slippage. Then press the two thumbs about an inch apart on the selvage and the nap, pull straight out, first the warp way, then the fill; way. If the towel is sleazy, you will feel an instant give.

Shake it. If it is firmly woven, the towel will give a dull sound. If it is thin, it will snap.

Bath towels tear first at the hems or selvage. They must be tightly woven and all the filling threads, running across the towel, should be firmly wrapped around the outside warp threads, which run the length of the towel. Low-priced towels are often woven on wide looms, then cut apart lengthwise. This edge may be lockstitched or hemmed. Neither finish is as satisfactory as the wrapped selvage. The ends of the towel should have smoothly folded and stitched hems with no ragged ends showing. To fill its role adequately, a bath towel must take up water quickly. This is the job of the pile. The more

### Coxcomb For Summer And Winter

Coxcomb or Celosia

A few plants of coxcomb (celosia) will decorate the garden and be appreciated when summer is gone. They make excellent winter decorations if hung heads downward and allowed to dry thoroughly when their feathery-like flowers in a variety of pastel shades make a delightful, and colorful display.

Their massive flowerbeds make a vivid appearance in the garden, and may well be used as accents for the border, or used to fill in dull spots. They come in a variety of colors, including yellows, golds, scarlets, crimsons, carmine and orange, all exceptionally brilliant.

They are tender annuals and should be planted late in the season, or transplanted from pots grown in the house. Take care of towels. Clip loose ends, do not pull them. Wash before badly soiled and rest them between washings. Shake, but do not iron.
