Murder Accused Aided Police In Search For Clues

(By The Canadian Press)
ST. CATHARINES, Ont., Feb. 28 —A murder trial witness said today that two days after Sidney George Chambers, 34, allegedly strangled to death nine-year-old Marian Rusnak, the cannery plant watchman and stationary engineer helped police search the plant grounds for clues to the girl's disappearance.

The witness, Constable William Watson, said the search took place Christmas Day and that Chambers was close at hand when police found in the factory yard the Christmas wrapping paper later identified as having come from a present the little girl carried when she disappeared.

Constable Watson told the story of the search on this second day of the trial of the sharp-featured, black-browed Chambers on a charge of murder.

The search the officer referred to was one in which hundreds of St. Catharines citizens took part Christmas week. In the days following the child's disappearance from house to house and probed attaples and rubbish heaps in a thorough hunt for anything that might help solve the mystery of the girl's fate.

Livestock

Summary
Increased receipts of cattle at central markets, due principally to improved weather and road conditions, served to bring prices down to levels prevailing a couple of weeks ago. Toronto declined 25c to 50c and western markets were 25c to 50c lower. Calves declined \$1.00 at Toronto but otherwise there was practically no change in the live stock structure.

Eastern Cattle Markets
Cattle deliveries to yards and plants in Ontario were the heaviest for any week this year and buyers succeeded in paring prices 25c to 50c by the close at Toronto. Weighted steers at this market were priced at \$14.50 to \$14.75 for top quality, and butcher steers up to \$14. Trading was fairly steady to strong at Montreal, with reasonably good steers making \$13.50 to \$14, a few tops \$14.50 to \$15, and good ones mostly \$10.50 to \$11 and \$11.50. In the Maritimes higher prices outside have been attracting receipts of cattle, and local offerings are continuing light. Medium to good steers and heifers were quoted at \$11.75 to \$12.25.

Western Cattle Markets
With improved road conditions, it was mostly a buyers' market in western Canada, prices declining anywhere from 25c to 75c. Winnipeg set the pace, working 50c to 75c lower, with choice steers selling to an extreme top of \$14 and the better grades of killers mostly \$13 to \$13.50. At Calgary, good to choice butchers of the steers \$12.50 to \$13.25; while Edmonton paid \$13 to \$13.50; Prince Albert \$12.25; Moose Jaw \$13.50; Saskatoon \$13.15 to \$13.50.

Exports to United States
Dairy cattle exports to the United States for the week totalled 655 head, compared with 849 in the corresponding period last year. This year's exports to date are 3,983 head, while in the same period last year shipments totalled 5,076.

Calves Decline at Toronto
There was a reduction of \$1.00 in calf prices at Toronto but elsewhere the market was unchanged. Best veals at Toronto sold at \$15 to \$17, Montreal \$17.50 to \$18, Winnipeg \$15 to \$16.50, Calgary \$12 to \$13, Edmonton \$13 to \$13.75, Prince Albert \$13, Moose Jaw up to \$15, and Saskatoon up to \$15.50.

Hogs Generally Unchanged
Aside from minor changes on Alberta markets, hog prices remained steady. Toronto paid \$21.75 for Grade A, Montreal a general \$22.25, Winnipeg \$20.40 with some to local butchers at \$20.70, Calgary \$20.35, Edmonton \$20.75 for shipment, and \$19.90 at plants, Prince Albert, Moose Jaw and Saskatoon \$19.75, Vancouver \$21.65, and Moncton \$22.25.

Truro Minister Indicted by Presbytery

Judicated
The church bulletin today made mention of this when it referred to the letter received from the presbytery of Halifax and Lunenburg as follows: "You are indicted by the presbytery of Halifax and Lunenburg at the instance of said presbytery to appear at Halifax, Nova Scotia, on the 4th day of March, 1947, to answer to the following charge, namely, that you are following a divisive course and acting in a manner contrary to the dignity of a minister of our church, and that the sermons published and distributed by you be the grounds of the evidence, which conduct of yours was contrary to the laws of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and inconsistent with your position as a minister of the Gospel."

This notice addressed to Mr. Rockwood was signed by appointment of the presbytery by Rev. Frank Lawson, Halifax, Moderator, and T. K. MacLellan, Halifax, presbytery secretary.

Four Sermons

Ask Municipalities To Defer Projects

OTTAWA, Feb. 26 (CP) — A number of Canadian municipalities are being advised by the Federal Government to defer building that chiepled post-war project until some time in 1946 when labor and building materials are expected to be in better supply. W. E. Uren, director-general of priorities, said today.

However, the officer emphasized, the Federal Government has no power to instruct municipalities on what they may build or when they may build them, and merely offers the advice — when requested — on the basis of its knowledge of the building situation.

The Federal Government assigned priority ratings only to housing, military hospitals and military health and recreation centres. Federal priority policy is designed to channel essential goods into such construction. Assignment of other priorities, under an order-in-council passed at the last session of parliament, has been left in the hands of the municipalities.
