SOLDIER WELCOMED.—A hearty welcome was tendered Pte. Harry J. Leslie on his arrival home, at Harmony Station, Thursday evening. His two sisters were already home from the west (where they were teaching school) to greet him. Private Leslie left with the 7th Seige Battery in May, 1916. His comrade, Jack McVarish, Harmony, was killed, and Leslie received a medal for bravery in rescuing his remains. Later he was gassed but recovered completely.

TO OPEN BRANCH HERE.—Mr. Tancrede Brevennu, Vice-President of the bank and Mr. Maurice Larose, Chief Inspector of the Provincial Bank of Canada are in Charlottetown concluding arrangements for the opening of a branch of the Bank here in the premises recently occupied by L. J. Reddin. It is also the intention to open a branch in Summerside. This Bank has 88 branches in Canada. The President is Sir H. Laporte, P. C., who was President of the war purchasing Committee at Ottawa, during the war, and is a Director of the Canadian National Railway Board.

A TIMELY RESCUE.—While Messrs Bert Andrew and George McKay of New London were driving to Emerald Junction yesterday they noticed that the house of Mrs. Benard Smith about a quarter of a mile from the station was on fire. They rushed to the scene and found that the only occupants of the house at the time were two little children. They also found the fire confined to some clothing hanging on the walls which had evidently caught from a lamp nearby. They quickly got a supply of water and extinguished the blaze. But for their timely arrival on the scene and their prompt action the house might have been destroyed and their children have lost their lives.

Annual Meeting St. Peters Congregation

The annual Congregational Meeting of St. Peters Cathedral was held last evening. Rev. Canon Simpson in the chair. The Treasurer's report showed the total receipts for the year to be \$7116.51, of this \$1560.71 was from special collections and offerings including Home and Foreign Missions. All the Societies of the church had done excellent work. An interesting report of the Red Cross showed that they had raised \$238 during the year and \$586.45 since the war began, all donations, and subscriptions, there being no sales or entertainments. The congregation has also given \$1272.17 to the prisoners of war during the last three years. The envelope clerk announced that most of the envelope holders had increased their contributions 20 per cent during the year, and that there were a number of new subscriptions.

The Priest incumbent called attention to the fact that on June 13 next the church will have been open fifty years and asked that a committee be appointed to arrange for a suitable commemoration of the jubilee.

It was decided to erect a fitting memorial to those of the congregation who had fallen in the war.

A VICTORY MATINEE

LONDON, Jan. 25.—In an autograph message to British newspapers in support of a victory matinee to be given at the London Coliseum on February 2 by the National Union of Journalists. Premier Lloyd George writes "the British nation is full of admiration and gratitude for the way in which the United States took her part in winning the victory for the freedom of the world and the welfare of mankind. This co-operation has served to give additional weight and permanency of the bonds of friendship and sympathy which exists between the people of United States and Britain. It is proposed by the journalists union to offer the Premier's letter for sale at a New York theatre simultaneously and the sale of an autograph copy of President Wilson's fourteen points at the Coliseum.

Expression Of Appreciation

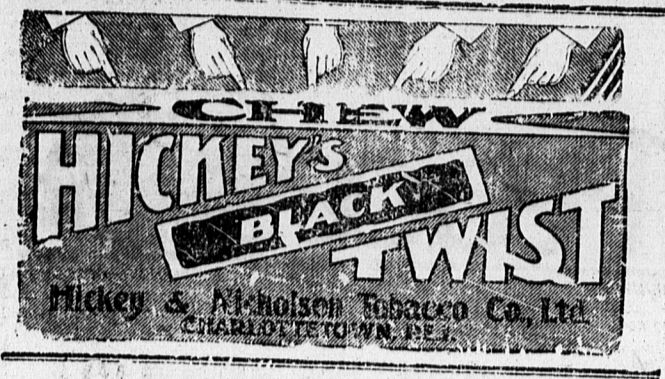
An expression of appreciation of Caldwell L. O. L., to Mrs. H. Morrison and troupe for their services rendered at King George Hall, Kensington.
