TRADE BOARD'S PROTEST RE S.S. HOCHELAGA

Protest against the discontinuance of the service of the S. S. Hochelaga was made to Ottawa by the Charlottetown Board of Trade at a meeting of the Council of the Board yesterday morning. In reply to previous correspondence the following communication was read from Mr. W. Chester S. McLure, M.P.

Dear Mr. Kennedy:—Replying to your wire re S. S. Hochelaga, I may say that it is not a matter of how much the Government will save by the discontinuance of the service on Oct. 31st, but it is more a matter of how much loss can be averted to the S. S. Hochelaga.

Mr. McLure had wired the Board previously pointing out that the Hochelaga's net earnings for 1932 were about one-half the earnings of last year up to Sept. 30, and that in view of the fact that earnings for November would be about \$800, the agent of the steamer had asked from Ottawa to have the service discontinued. On Oct. 31, instead of the end of November as heretofore. The wire asked for the opinion of the Board on the matter.

The Board despatched a wire inquiring if the Government would make any saving on subsidy payments if the service were discontinued. The communication received yesterday from Mr. McLure, quoted above, is in reply to the Board's inquiry.

After discussion, participated in by Messrs E. T. Higgs, R. E. Mutch, S. A. MacDonald, R. L. Cotton and P. W. Turner, the following telegrams were sent:

Local press notices state that S. S. Hochelaga service between this city and Pictou N. S. will be discontinued November 1st. This Board of Trade protests most emphatically against any such disruption in this service, especially so at this time, as this boat since the cancelling of the second train service via Borden is carrying mails which would otherwise be further delayed enroute to this province. We depend on you to see that directions are given that contract for the season be carried out.

Letter twenty-sixth to hand this morning Board cannot understand your attitude which would seem to us to favor without saving to the Government further curtailment of the Limited Service now extended this province. Since the cancelling of second train service via Borden the mails from all American points and from Canadian points reaching Sackville after one p. m. are now forwarded to Pictou and reach Charlottetown via Hochelaga about one p. m. instead of eleven p. m. the payments if under the double train service, or at six thirty p. m. the same day as would be the case if Hochelaga service be discontinued. This Board has wired the Minister Trade and Commerce protesting most emphatically against cancelling Pictou service until contract for season expires.

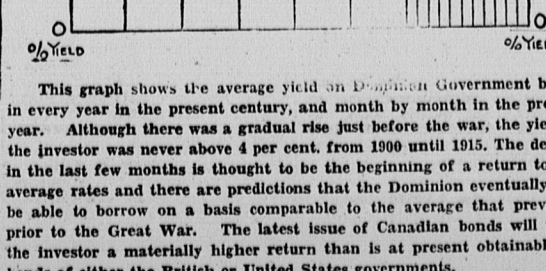

This graph shows the average yield on Dominion Government bonds in every year in the present century, and month by month in the present year. Although there was a gradual rise just before the war, the yield to the investor was never above 4 per cent. from 1900 until 1915. The decline in the last few months is thought to be the beginning of a return to low average rates and there are predictions that the Dominion eventually will be able to borrow on a basis comparable to the average that prevailed prior to the Great War. The latest issue of Canadian bonds will yield the investor a materially higher return than is at present obtainable on bonds of either the British or United States governments.
